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Senator Tyson's amendment is correctly framed. All right. Because of the sense of it, and I want to thank Senator Thompson for ferrying me over that treacherous water. Senator Tyson, on this occasion, is totally correct, which shows the truth of that statement that even the devil speaks truth on occasion. But in reality he has to tell the truth more often than he speaks untruth, otherwise you'd never believe. But in this instance, Senator Tyson gave a very thorough explanation of the deleterious effect of cigarette smoke, tobacco smoke on this building, the artwork, I would say the furniture, the drapes, everything in this building. But remember, in the same way that the Sabbath was made for human beings and human beings not for the Sabbath, a building is made for the benefit of human beings and not human beings for the benefit of the building. So, although a human being's body is referred to as a temple, that does not mean that reduces a human being to the status of brick and mortar buildings. We should not place a higher value on a material item, such as a building, than we do on the health and the welfare of the human beings who go into those places. There are residuals from smoking and, since we're going to address this issue, Senator Tyson's amendment is what we ought to be doing. Senator Tyson mentioned how many times...well, how many years, actually, he smoked. When I was very young, I think I puffed on a Lucky Strike because that was the mildest cigarette in those days, and the rest of the time we would light a piece of rope just so it would glow on the end and make smoke and stick that in your head and play like you were smoking. But...and Senator Beutler asked me, did I inhale. I didn't even know how to inhale. I didn't even know what "inhale" meant. But at this point, with what is happening throughout the world, we ought to set the tone and the example by this legislation. Other countries are starting to file lawsuits against the tobacco industry located in the United States. I don't see any need to tiptoe around the issue. I am, apart from this issue, sympathetic toward anybody who has an addiction. People, if they had a choice, uncoerced by that terrible dependency, would probably give up many addictions that they have, maybe most, maybe not all. But this is not an issue where we're talking about compassion or understanding toward those who have an addiction. We're talking about the health and the safety...
