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because it's not going to work. If I simply strike the word "primary" from the committee amendment, then what would be left in the bill is the term "primary buildings". So what I would need to do is strike the word "public" from the committee amendment. Then all that the committee amendment will remove from the bill is the word "primary". So I will ask the Clerk, would you substitute the word "public" for "primary" that I have up there on that yellow sheet which I signed? Then I will explain how it's going to operate.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Chambers, would it be cleaner if we...if we withdraw your amendment and redraft it?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: And...and at this point in time... Senator Chambers, I think we can...I think we can, since it's a fairly simple change, we can do it. Ordinarily, I'd want you to withdraw it, but...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, I understand, and I'm trying to be accommodating this morning.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Thank you.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Members of the Legislature, the committee amendment would strike the two words "primary" and "public" from the bill. If that amendment were adopted we would just have these meetings in any building. By striking the word "public" from the committee amendment, it means that the word "public" would be left in the original bill, and the only word removed from the original bill would be the term "primary". So what the effect of my amendment would be is to change the committee amendment so that the only word it removes from the bill is "primary", and that would be found at page 4, in line 2. And this is what the language on line 2 would say, if my amendment and the committee amendment would be adopted, "the notice are located within public buildings". And I would hope that you would adopt this amendment, then other aspects of the bill, as far as I'm concerned, I'd be willing to discuss with Senator Cudaback, and whoever else he says is interested in it, to see if changes need to be made in other parts of the bill.
