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rehabilitation, I've been rehabbed. But I wouldn't want to deprive anybody of the wonderful opportunity to enter that institution and determine whether or not they can survive it intact. And if, by allowing a little swilling, a little nip of John Barleycorn was going to facilitate that, my usual opposition would not have been so strong. But in view of what has emerged and the scope that is encompassed in this amendment, I'm not sure that I can support it now. I would like to ask Senator Janssen a question.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Janssen, would you respond?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Janssen, had you been told that this would apply to weddings that are held on, you know, at times when...well, were you told that it applied to weddings?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Yes, I understand there are some weddings that are held at universities, yeah. Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Were you told that there were other things too to which it would apply?

SENATOR JANSSEN: That was the one thing that was mentioned, was weddings and anniversaries, things like this.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Then why did you answer "yes" when you asked, could it include baseball games?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Well, I imagine it could if they so desired to do that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: It could be one of the kinds of events that they would sanction.

SENATOR JANSSEN: It would be up to that...up to that school.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But that was not what...the kind of event that was told to you when the amendment was brought to you, is that true?
