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bit of money to be able to get their car fixed so that they can continue to work. And so the housing authority might make that loan to the individual. In a situation where...where they are doing a development, the developer, the private entity would have a loan for most of it but there might be a very small portion that was not covered by the first loan and the housing authority might lend the private developer that aspect of it, and then they would be the secondary source of revenue towards the project. So those are a couple examples of things that where the public housing authority needs to have very limited authority to make loans. They are not going to be in a position either from having the financial resources or with the language of this amendment to be able to make...to make loans that would be a substantial portion of a project or would be a substantial amount of money to an individual. So it's a very limited kind of authority that does not, in the opinion now of the banking organization and other people that have been worked with, does not infringe on their territory in terms of lending. And so that was...this portion of the amendment has been agreed upon by those individuals who are concerned about it. To some of the more basic issues that Senator Wehrbein brought up. I think we're going to have to determine how we feel about providing housing for low-income individuals and especially looking at the situation that we have in some of our less populated areas where we have the elderly population that is very often low income. The waiting lists are extremely long in those areas, and sometimes it's even difficult to provide services without the option that...the final option on the yellow sheet, of affiliates.

SENATOR CUDABACK PRESIDING

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BROWN: It's difficult to even have those services provided. So I...we're going to need to determine how we feel about whether we want to see elderly people, who may have no other options in terms of a place to live, not being able to have housing and that's what it comes down to. And so, if there are concerns about some of the more populated areas and concerns about competition, then let's deal with those, but I think that we need to move forward on this legislation, primarily for
