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SENATOR KIEL: In-between whatever happens to it between public hearing and being voted out on the consent calendar.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: It's still in committee?

SENATOR KIEL: No, it's been voted out. It's on General File, I'm sorry.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I got to think about this one, because there's...and that's all I want to ask you. Thank you, Senator Kiel. See, I know people who have had dealings with repossessions, and it may not be the gentleman that she's talking about, but dealers, repo people, bill collectors and those others are not the ones that I place the greatest amount of confidence in, in terms of them not cutting a corner.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time, Senator Chambers. Thank you. Senator Chambers, you're recognized again.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I'd like to ask Senator Kiel about two more questions.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Kiel, would you yield to questions?

SENATOR KIEL: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Kiel, how often has this happened to this person in the last calendar year, if you know? Just an estimate.

SENATOR KIEL: Probably anywhere between 10 and 15 times. I'll go back and look at the testimony for you also, because he originally did testify.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, I meant I needed to get an approximate number, and that's what I wanted. It's always being ticketed in the drive...in the parking lot of his business?

SENATOR KIEL: Primarily their concern was the tickets that they were getting, because the car was parked. I think he mentioned that there were...twice they were stopped by police and ticketed
