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LB 661

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Brashear. We are discussing the Kristensen amendment and it has been divided into two parts, FA251 and FA252. Any further discussion? Senator Kristensen, to close on your first part.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Thank you, Mr. President. Members, I don't think the definition change...I think it's more accurate definition change. Senator Beutler, if you'll look at it, it does talk about which ones of those particular dates. And at some point in time you'll probably have a Revisor's bill that will come back and say all these particular dates have passed and we're just going to strike this stuff out as it relates to the computer date failures. But at least at this point in time, I think that definition, I know that there's been representatives of the Policy Research Office that have had some interest and I believe that this date is an acceptable, this definition is acceptable to them as well. I'd urge its adoption.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Kristensen. The question before the body is shall the first part being FA251 be adopted to LB 661? All in favor vote aye, opposed nay. We're voting on the first part of the divided question. Please vote if you care to. Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the adoption of the first component.

SENATOR CUDABACK: FA251 is adopted to LB 661. We are now discussing the second part being FA252 to LB 661. Senator Kristensen. (See page 2270 of the Legislative Journal.)

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Thank you, Mr. President. I want to make sure that I explain this portion of it, and I don't want to lead people to believe that this is a radically controversial part. What we've tried to do is structure this so it's easier for you to identify the pieces and the parts because it can get a little confusing. We've narrowed it down to this is the part that's probably the one that is the deviation from the committee amendment, but I think is a reasonable deviation to do.
