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think it ought to be clear to people now that I'm very sensitive about things that affect groups that I'm concerned about--minority groups, especially black people, women. And when an approach is taken to determine whether commissions ought to continue to exist at all, I'm unwilling to have the experimentation always start with one of the groups that I find to be in need of particular concern from a Legislature. Often, and I've been in the world a long time and have paid attention to these things, often things are explained on the basis of coincidence. It just happens to be happening this way with reference to this group. Maybe that's true. But as you get older and you pay attention and get a deeper understanding of human nature and how things work in the real world, especially if you've laid a wager on an athletic event or some other activity, you know that, if conduct always goes the same direction and the negative impact always is upon the same groups, that is not coincidence, that is design. The Legislature does not have to adopt the amendment simply because Senator Stuhr offered it. I will accept what she said about her motivation, but I'd like to ask her a question.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Stuhr, would you yield to a question?

SENATOR STUHR: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Stuhr, have you offered a sunset amendment to any other commission?

SENATOR STUHR: I...I can't recall that I have...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you.

SENATOR STUHR: ...right now.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. And I'm not going to hammer that. That's all that I have. Thank you. I'm not going to hammer that. I don't know of anybody on the floor who has done such a thing. The only move in the direction of eliminating commissions was in a bill that Senator Schimek presented and discussing a bill of that kind gives the opportunity to review the wisdom of having a proliferation of commissions, period. Then maybe you would go through and systematically review the
