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tell you why I think the bill is overloaded now, and I don't know who selected the language for this bill. Oh, Senator Engel said his county attorney did, which shows that anybody can be elected to a county attorney who can get enough votes. You don't have to know anything about the law. Oh, may I ask Senator Engel a question, Mr. President?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Engel, will you yield to a question?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Engel, I heard you say that your county attorney has been having problems with this and you were not going to say who drafted the bill.

SENATOR ENGEL: No, the county attorney did not draft the bill. He...he...he brought the problem to me.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Don't laugh. You said the county attorney did not draft the bill. Hee, hee, hee, it's not funny.

SENATOR ENGEL: No, no, well,...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Go ahead.

SENATOR ENGEL: ...I stu...stu...stu...stu...stu..stutter when I talk to the master debater here. (Laughter)

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh, okay.

SENATOR ENGEL: But the thing is, he did not draft the bill. He just brought this problem to my attention. I thought we had something like this on the books, but we didn't. So that's...that's...he just brought it to my attention.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So then you are not in a position where, whatever we work out, you have to pass by your county attorney to...I mean you haven't...here's what I am saying, not that he runs you, but you have not committed yourself to run by him anything that we would come up with, before you can agree to it?

SENATOR ENGEL: Absolutely not.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, thank you.
