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done, and I'm supposed to be quiet and go along to get along. No way. So Bartu has been swept off the stage. There was a judge who said if the house, speaking of the judiciary, if the judicial house is to be cleansed, it ought to be done by those inhabitants and not left to an outsider, but an outsider is necessary in this state. I'm going to turn on my light again and nobody who supports this bill need comment because I'm not attacking the bill.

SENATOR CUDABACK: You may continue, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, and should I run out of time because I can only speak three times, I'm going to offer some motions, none of which I will carry to a vote, and I do not want to contrive amendments to this proposed constitutional amendment because I have no problem with what is being attempted by this bill. And had the judges not done so much wrong and had not the Supreme Court been dragging its feet so much, I would have signed on to Senator Brashear's proposal. But I have to use the opportunities when we're discussing matters pertaining to the judges or the judiciary to make these items I'm talking about public. When we have another discussion on another matter, which will flow from a motion I'm going to offer, I will discuss some other misbehaving judges and ask, where was the Attorney General and some of these others who are sworn to uphold the law? I hear many people on this floor defend the necessity of a partisan system, and they do speak as partisans and they are very partisan, but I speak as one who takes seriously my responsibilities as a lawmaker. I don't carry labels on myself. I'm not beholden to a party. I'm not beholden to a system. I am beholden to justice and the law being enforced and administered in a way that is fair and impartial. There was another judge, and this one lives in a city beside the river, Senator Redfield, a wide, flowing muddy river. Boats ply that river going both directions. When the river is high, big boats can ply it. When the river is lower, the bigger boats cannot but other little boats do. And people throughout the rank, the realm, will sometimes recreate on that river and others, Senator Smith, may procreate. But at any rate, in this city, there dwells an unjust judge. This judge had a reputation among those who did not know him for being fair and impartial, but those who knew him knew him to be a scoundrel or, as Elmer Fudd might say,
