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price hasn't gone down in the stores much, but why can't the producer take advantage of that, but he can't just go slaughter a hog and sell only the bacon, not if there's a lot of other products too. So I was wondering really the practicality of this.

SENATOR ROBAK: You know, I'm having a hard time hearing. There seems to be a lot of conversation on the floor and I really don't understand your question. Are you asking me...what?

SENATOR KREMER: Well, I...there's just a lot of things involved other than just selling one product off of the animal and I was just wondering what the, you know, if there's a lot of requests for this.

SENATOR ROBAK: If it's state inspected, Senator, they will be able, this producer, will be able to...not the producer, the plant will be able to sell it in the state of...in our own cities and counties right here, our restaurants, which they cannot do now. They cannot do that now.

SENATOR KREMER: (inaudible).

SENATOR ROBAK: When the Congress passes the bill that they're introducing now, then we will also be able to ship the local produce over...over state lines. What I'm hearing here is we're talking a lot about the plants; well, what happened about the plants? Well, if...what we really want to do, we want to give farmers the opportunity. We want them to have an opportunity to produce their...to market their own, even whether they have a custom plant or not. They can do it through a custom plant or they can form cooperative plants and open their own plant, so that's also in this bill.

SENATOR KREMER: Okay.

SENATOR ROBAK: Did that answer your question?

SENATOR KREMER: Well, I don't know. It...there's just a lot of things involved that, on the surface, sound really good, but it just isn't practical. Senator Janssen, would you like to have some comments on this or something? So thank you.
