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including members of local boards described in Section 117, sub (b), sub (A), sub (i) of the federal Workforce Investment Act. Well, you and I can have no idea what we're talking about unless we get into Section 117 sub (b) sub (2) sub (A) sub (1) (sic--(i)) of the federal act. And I guess what I'm contending with in my own mind is why do we allow our own bill drafters to reference the federal statute like that, in a way that makes it cryptic for you and I and everybody that attempts to read this? Maybe we should take a little more time and have the bill drafters go into that 117 sub (b) sub (2) sub (A) sub (1) (sic--(i)) and explicitly right down what's there for us to read in context so we know what our state law says. We've done this in numerous places in this 31 pages and the result of all that is that we cannot possibly have an understanding of what this bill does. When I look at the composition of the board, for example, I notice that there appear to be no limitations as to the numbers of representatives from different areas. There's no limitation on the business. There's no limitation on the labor. Normally, when you and I work on something like this that's purely at the state level, we're quite cognizant of and aware of a certain balancing act that goes on in these things. Well, there's no balancing act here. Is that because the federal government says the Governor shall be given this prerogative without limitation? Or did the executive branch, who is giving us this, decided that that's the way they would simply like to do it, that they would like the Governor to determine what the balance is on this very important board? Or is there some other rationale that all of this is left so vague? Normally on something like this, there's some cognizance of urban-rural representation and being representation from all three congressional districts. There's nothing like that in this composition. Again, is that because that's required or that's somebody in our state government's idea, somebody in our Bill Drafters' room idea of how things should be? This...this whole thing becomes quite difficult to handle. I guess we can take it on faith and learn our lessons eventually down...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: One minute.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...down the line if that's what...that's what we want to do, but do we really have to do business that way? I
