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SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you, Mr. President, members. I'm still not quite certain on this amendment. Again, I still support the bill. I think that Senator Matzke has a pretty good point in that, you know, some of these McDonald's franchises, you know, have \$1 million in profit per year, but on the other hand, unless it's somebody that has capital, they're not going to start a business here anyway. So, Senator Chambers, if you'd like a little bit of my time to kind of finish fleshing this out a little bit and kind of offer a justification as to why we should adopt this amendment, I'd be glad to give you a minute or two.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Bourne. Members of the Legislature, Senator Matzke is not interested in a means test or assets test for anybody. He has a negative attitude toward an operation like McDonald's. I'd like to ask him a question so that I won't misrepresent his position. Senator Matzke,...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Matzke.

SENATOR MATZKE: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...would you be in favor of putting a restriction on the maximum assets anybody can have who would seek to take advantage of this bill? Then we're not picking out a particular franchise or operation, but setting a standard that goes across the board for everybody. Would you be willing to do that?

SENATOR MATZKE: That's completely outside of the rationale of this bill.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That's not what I'm asking.

SENATOR MATZKE: In other words, you can't discriminate against people on the basis of whether they are rich or poor.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But you want to...
