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the only one that would purport to apply some kind of criminal penalty to officers or directors of a corporation?

SENATOR BROMM: In the subject area of this, I believe that's right.

SENATOR BEUTLER: So another thing we're doing here is making the decision that there shall be no more criminal penalties in this particular area. Would that be accurate?

SENATOR BROMM: I would say that that would be accurate, um-hum.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. And with respect to the general civil penalty section in 75-156, again to get the full dimensions of this, can a civil penalty in the case of a corporate violation be levied directly against a corporate officer or a member of the board of directors...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...in any kind of circumstance?

SENATOR BROMM: Senator, with respect to the PSC which we're talking about levying fines here, I don't think they would have jurisdiction over...I don't think they would have jurisdiction over the officers or directors personally. I think the matters that would come before them would be matters involving the company, matters that they would have to levy a fine against a company for. There is a provision that we preserved in here for any party who claims to have been wronged or claims a violation by a company of any of this area of telecommunications to bring their own...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Time.

SENATOR BROMM: ...proceeding in district court.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Beutler. (Visitors introduced.) Senator Landis, on the Bromm amendment.
