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enhance our appropriating process so that we're not under quite the stricture that we otherwise would be. And again, this is first about just the opportunity to talk and think about it and be creative; and, secondly, then after some of us have done that to decide what it is we would like to do with it. I would urge the continued consideration of the amendment and its ultimate adoption unless we can think of a good reason we ought not. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Brashear. Senator Cudaback.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Mr. President, members, I guess I just want to stand up and say that I'm opposed to taking all the money out of this fund. We put this money in the fund in good faith. We did this, that was my priority bill last year. Senator Bohlke introduced the bill. We had many, many schools down here that were here in good faith. They knew we did this in good faith. If we pull the rug out on them now, where are we going to be in the future? They believe in this, they think we did this for a cause and that is an insurance policy for the schools. Now maybe \$2.5 million is too much. Maybe 2.8 is too much. I'm not, you know, I'm not saying it's too much, not enough, or whatever. If we need to transfer some of that, no sense in having \$2 million lie there for the next 20 years. Maybe that's too much. Maybe Senator Brashear and maybe Senator Beutler, whomever, has an idea to transfer some of the dollars. But I certainly am against transferring all \$2.8 million of this and everybody on this floor should be against that also. We just can't do that to the public. We just can't. We passed that in good faith. If we come back here and change that, boom, where are we going to be with those public that are listening right now? Think about that. If they want to transfer some of it out, let's find out how much we need there. Like I say, maybe 2.8 is too much. Is it? But let's leave those...let's don't kill that bill that we started last year for the insurance policy for those schools that may need this for some fluke. Don't say flukes don't happen. A fluke did happen. It may happen again. All I can say is let's just let it get together and leave some dollars there for future. And like I say, \$2.5 million or \$2.8 million may be too much. And Senator Beutler, Senator Brashear, Senator Bohlke, Senator Bromm or
