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SENATOR QUANDAHL: I could...I could find out and get back to you on that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Have you talked to any officers who are trained in signs and wonders who could...who have told you what these signs are? Have you talked to any of them?

SENATOR QUANDAHL: Not today, no.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, in the past, what did they tell you about these signs, if anything?

SENATOR QUANDAHL: Well, it's, again, I think what...my previous statement holds: slurred speech, bloodshot eyes, odor of alcohol.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Is the consumption of alcohol the only thing that would cause a person's eyes to be bloodshot?

SENATOR QUANDAHL: No.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Do you think it's possible that after one of a long day of being put through the Ernie Chambers process some people, if they stuck it out, might have eyes with a tinge of blood in them?

SENATOR QUANDAHL: I would imagine that's true, yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And having come from John Barleycorn being served to them at one of these senators' functions, they'd have alcohol on their breath too, wouldn't they?

SENATOR QUANDAHL: That's possible.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But since they're not youngsters, this language we're talking about would not apply to them. Isn't that right?

SENATOR QUANDAHL: That's correct.
