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SENATOR JANSSEN: ...thirty, thirty.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Right.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Thirty.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. You were thinking about how much you mark up the cost of groceries for poor people. (Laughter) Thank you, Senator Janssen. Members of the Legislature, this changeover from the paper coupons to this card, this electronic card is an opportunity for greed to intervene and gouging to occur. Now, as well as I know my friends on the floor, I can't say they are gougers. I don't know about the greed part. But I am not going to stand here or sit in the chair and let this take place. What is it that we're talking about? A business proposition. What the grocers want to do is find a way to maximize their income, and we can understand that. But I'm not going to watch them do it on the backs of a program designed to help the poor. And I can listen, as my friends who want to support this bill will say, well, we're going to save the state money because if we use our own machines then the state is not out of the cost of the machines. I'd like to ask Senator Janssen a question.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Janssen, if you...if this bill passes, forget whatever amount might be in it for each transaction. Would the grocer get that transaction amount, whether he uses his own machine or the state's machine?

SENATOR JANSSEN: No.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: When would he not get it?

SENATOR JANSSEN: He would not get that if he used the state's machine.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And you're saying that this bill is going to cause grocers to use which machine?
