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SENATOR VRTISKA: But your analogy is that that's the only way they can survive, is to be a corporate type structure who...who increases to the size that they're able to be profitable. Is that correct?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, I didn't say all of that.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Well, but I interpreted what you said to mean that...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Right, and when...

SENATOR VRTISKA: ...and if I'm wrong then correct me.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: When you interpret what I mean then you come up with a conclusion that is not necessarily mine, so I'd rather you ask me a question at a time on each aspect of that. Then I'll give you my answer.

SENATOR VRTISKA: (Laugh) By the time I get around to all the questions I forgot what they were and so I (laugh)...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: (Laugh) Well, I'd hope my answers would stick and you'd go tell people, those who are doing this work, get smarter or get bigger or get out.

SENATOR VRTISKA: All right. I appreciate your answers, Senator Chambers,...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.

SENATOR VRTISKA: ...and I won't bother you anymore. I just wanted to make a couple of comments about the bill as I see it. I signed on to this bill because I thought it was a thing that many states are doing; it's a direction they're going. I do have some problems, to be quite frank with you at this point, because Nebraska is a very unique state in the fact that it has such diverse...so...such wide diversity across the state from the Sandhills to the southeast where we have nothing but clay and gumbo, and out in the Sandhills where they have lots of
