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they're ready to be educated, I think you'll see more people using seats beyond age four, but I don't think they're ready for us to make this a...a fine and a law that is immediately enforceable. That's my sense of things.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you. And...and, if I might, Senator Thompson, I'd like to ask you a question, if I could?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Thompson, would you yield to a question from Senator Schimek?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: I don't know how much time we have left...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute, also, Senator Schimek.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you.

SENATOR THOMPSON: Thank you.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Senator Thompson, I don't know if you heard Senator Bromm's response to mine, but one of the things he mentioned is taking kids to baseball practice or whatever now. The law, right now, says you have to be strapped in if you're over five years of age, correct?

SENATOR THOMPSON: Yeah, actually, over four.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Or over four? Okay. What I'm getting at is not the age, but is it going to be any different for...with using these...these seats, these booster seats, are you going to be able to get fewer kids in the back seat of a car than you were otherwise?

SENATOR THOMPSON: Well, they all were...have to be belted currently.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Okay. That's what...

SENATOR THOMPSON: And you need a belt to use a booster seat.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: And there's only so many belts in the back of
