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but it is a...an interlocal group, is going to issue bonds. And with the proceeds of those bonds, and there will be a number of issuances, with the proceeds of those bonds, they are going to begin construction of a radio system. It was to my amazement that...to find out that you could not go down to Radio Shack, ask for one seamless state public safety radio system, and not be able to buy it. It has to be constructed; it has to be set up. It has to have operating spectrum. None of these things are going to come quickly, and until it's in operation, it will generate no revenue with which to repay the bonds. So to question how this has an impact on this budget or, for that matter, I believe, next year and possibly 2004-2005, is getting the cart before the horse. There is no revenue. There is only the issuance of the bonds, the spending of the money until it operates. Now do I know all the fine details? No, I do not. Do I know anything much about a radio? Under great stress, I can figure out how to turn one on. I have trouble with the stations, however. The problem with what we're discussing today is that it's my understanding, and I wasn't here to hear it, but people started talking about the inadequacies of our radio system in 1983. That's 19 years ago. They did a study in the mid-eighties. They did another study about 1992. They did another study, I think that was the Ram report, and one was the Hogan report, one was the Ram report, in 1995. Since 19...the summer of 1997, we have been pushing on this project, and this is as far as it's ever gotten. I really think we ought to come to a crashing halt right now because it's only 19 years. We need to give this more thought. We could be working on a heliograph system. That's where you catch the rays of the sun from mountaintop to mountaintop. We could be using smoke signals. When are we going to do something? I don't know, but I think we ought to put it off because we need to know exactly to the penny the impact on our \$3 billion budget. Now the \$87 million I was talking about this morning is going to be paid back over 10 or 15 years, and there's also going to be some operating costs, and the state is going to have to pay their share of those as do the communities, as do the counties, as do the fire services, as does emergency management, as does the State Patrol. That's part of the state. And they start paying it as they use it. So I think the suggestions that we really...
