So maybe what they ought to do is get down on all fours and bark like dogs and they'd have more rights in the eyes of these Catholics and others on this floor, mainly "Repelicans", who say to them draw not nigh unto me for you are unclean. And you're not ashamed and you're not embarrassed, and you want me to shut up and not talk about this. Why, every time I think about it I get inflamed all over again. Talk about tired? It's 4:26 and I'm tired?
