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think that's good, as far as that goes. And then if we do nothing, the universities will continue to go to the bank and borrow that money. What we're trying to do is come up with an opportunity here so that the universities can spend more money on actual education; can improve perhaps the facilities, can improve the delivery of that education. And so it's a matter of doing what I think is best for our universities, allowing them to do what other states are going into. Like I said, sometimes it may be used. It all depends on economic conditions. I think today, frankly, they'd be better going to a bank than to go out into the short-term market with bonds. However, there are other times, as you could see on the sheet, when it was advantageous to go into the municipal bond market. We have those investors out there. They're not just Nebraskans. They could be investors from Iowa and other places. And most bond purchasers will buy these entities, whether they be in Nebraska or whether they be elsewhere across the United States. I think this is an opportunity that we could keep some of our Nebraska institutions strong and growing, and also we could provide an opportunity for those who do bond investing to invest into those entities. And I would just, again, urge the adoption of LB 107.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Jensen. (Visitors introduced.) Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Speaker and members of the Legislature, in the animal kingdom, Senator Jensen, there are critters like crocodiles which bite off huge chunks of flesh and bone and just swallow it. They don't chew it. Owls and certain other raptors do the same thing. They just tear off the flesh, swallow it, and then they cough up feathers and whatever else they can't digest. There are other critters who are more genteel in their eating habits. Were I a hippopotamus, I could take a bushel barrel of these apples and pour them down; in one mouthful, they're gone. But having smaller teeth and a different methodology of eating, I would say that my consumption of this apple is done in a more genteel manner. Some of my colleagues go right to the heart of the issue, like the crocodile, and just rip off chunks in the way that Senator Redfield did--got right to the point. Senator Beutler is like a combination crocodile-hippopotamus, and I'll have a word and a rhyme for a
