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convictions, I think I need to be off the road. I don't think, if I've been picked up again with a test of .20, I don't think I should have my license back for several months while this thing is pending. And so that amendment I think gets to the heart of what we were talking about last week. And I wish I could say, okay, let's go back and reinstate the law the way it was, where you have the automatic stay for no reason, but I just don't feel that's in the best interests of the public. And I think we've got a good...I really think the people that worked on this legislation, and they were others that I should give credit to, not myself, I think they did a good piece of work here and I think this would take...this would take part of the heart out of the bill, and that's why I'm unwilling to break. But I will bend, Senator Chambers, I will bend, and I'm...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SPEAKER BROMM: ...offering to bend. And so that's where we're at. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Bromm. (Visitors introduced.) On with discussion, Senator Bourne.

SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you, Mr. President. Members, I'm trying to get a hold of what's happening here and I was wondering if perhaps Senator Bromm or Senator Chambers would yield to a question. All we've heard about is how Senator Chambers is a teetotaler and I kind of don't understand what's going on with this appeal process. Senator Chambers, would you yield to a question or two?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, I will.

SENATOR BOURNE: Okay. We've discussed this issue last year, this ALR, and it seemed to me the...kind of the part that we discuss most was the fact that the Attorney General at that time, his office, had basically abandoned these prosecutions and put them back onto the county. Is that correct?
