CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the adoption of committee amendments.

SENATOR LANDIS: Thank you. The committee amendment is adopted. (Visitors introduced.) The committee amendment has been adopted. The bill has been opened. There are no lights on. Senator Mossey, for closing. Senator Mossey waives closing on the advancement of LB 112. The question is the advancement of LB 112 from General File. Those in favor vote aye; those opposed vote no. Mr. Clerk, you may record.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the advancement of LB 112.

SENATOR LANDIS: The measure successfully advances, and we move on to LB 267, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 267, introduced by Senator Tyson. (Read title.) Bill was introduced on January 13 of this year, at that time referred to the Judiciary Committee, advanced to General File. I do have committee amendments, Mr. President. (AM0134, Legislative Journal page 633.)

SENATOR LANDIS: Thank you. Senator Tyson, as the primary introducer, you are recognized for an introduction, sir.

SENATOR TYSON: Thank you, Senator Landis. LB 267 updates technical language in state statute and that update will permit the state of Nebraska to have continued access to the national criminal history records database for noncriminal purposes. Specifically, LB 267 requires that an applicant for a liquor license or a private detective license submit two legible sets of fingerprints to be given to the FBI by the State Patrol, and the purpose of this, of course, would be to check those fingerprints against the national criminal history database. Before granting access to the federal database for noncriminal justice purposes, such as issuing licenses for liquor license and private detective licenses, the FBI requires the state to
