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and that must be your current residency. Is that correct?

SENATOR BAKER: Senator Stuthman, I am not familiar with the township form of government. I have none of those in my district whatsoever. I couldn't answer that question. I'm sorry.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: Okay. I am a little bit concerned, you know, as, you know, we're dealing with commissioners on one side of the bill and then we're talking about supervisors also. I'm in...I'm really concerned about people that run for an office for a district and they do not currently live there. I have a real problem with that, as far as, you know, respect to the people that are in their district, or moving into another district and trying to, you know, be in control of that district. I realistically think that an individual would live in the district at the time that you file for this office. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Stuthman, thank you. Senator Wehrbein, followed by Senator Schimek.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I'm...very quickly. I'll ask...I want to Senator Schimek a question in a minute. But I'm uncomfortable with this. And I...she wants to explain about supervisors, and I understand. But it seemed to me...and I don't...I'm sorry to delay this. But a better solution would be to have an at-large with counties that are small, if that's the case. And then you don't have to worry about residency. Senator Schimek would like to answer a question about supervisor versus county board members. Would...?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Schimek, would you respond to a question?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes. And thank you, Mr. President, members. And thank you, Senator Wehrbein. This bill is just making the language consistent with what's already true for county supervisors. County supervisors already can be from outside the county. And the thing is that we have county assessors, we have county attorneys, supervisors, I think sheriffs. They all have
