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do it because I promised to do it, is to keep that from happening. If there are others who are opposed to this bill, I think they ought to get into the fray. But if they don't, I'm going to do what I said. Now this is one of those bills on which I have received quite a bit of mail. Before it came on the floor, I was getting a lot of mail from people telling me that I ought to vote for the bill. After we had that first discussion and it was clear that I'm opposed to the bill and want to kill it,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...I didn't get many letters from people telling me to support the bill. I got a few letters telling me how unfit I am to live and what ought to happen to me (laughter), but those are the very kind of people that Senator Tyson want to have carrying these pistols, and their very expressions indicate why they're the very ones who ought not to have them. But be that as it may, numerous people wrote saying that they oppose this bill; they hope the Legislature will not enact it. Some have even written into the columns to the editor, signed their names, expressed their opposition and have provided a rationale. So this is not one of those bills that the public is clamoring for. It's a bill that a few very loud people are clamoring for. And so I must do what I can to prevent...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...this...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. You've heard the opening on the motion to recommit LB 265 to a committee. Open for discussion on that motion offered by Senator Chambers.
