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SENATOR BOURNE: Okay, that would be great. And the purpose is, is that every state would adopt this. Is that accurate?

SENATOR TYSON: That is...that is the program, yes.

SENATOR BOURNE: Are you aware of any discussion at the federal level of the federal government setting forth standards on a prescription drug card...

SENATOR TYSON: No, I'm not.

SENATOR BOURNE: ...so that this legislation would not be necessary?

SENATOR TYSON: No, I am not.

SENATOR BOURNE: Okay. Do you have an idea, and I know that you're a fiscal conservative and you're very...a probusiness individual, do you have any idea what the cost to the people issuing these cards might be?

SENATOR TYSON: I have been told several figures, Senator Bourne. One was 85 cents. Another one was a dollar something.

SENATOR BOURNE: Well, you know...and I appreciate that, Senator Tyson, but you know as well as I do that in order to implement a procedure there's administrative costs, reprogramming computers, things of that nature, and you're suggesting that it's still 85 cents an insured or...

SENATOR TYSON: That was the information given to me,...

SENATOR BOURNE: Okay.

SENATOR TYSON: ...Senator Bourne.

SENATOR BOURNE: I have a few more questions. Are...you're aware of an entity or an organization called pharmacy benefit managers?

SENATOR TYSON: No, I'm not.
