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They are conditioned to respond a certain way, and they do. Go anyplace where women work, where women move, where women have their being, and not one of them has the final say-so, unless it's a place where only women are found. And that's the way things are done. So somebody has to draw the line and say, if you cross it, you may succeed, but you're going to have a very difficult time doing it, and you may regret it, because you may have expended more capital than you have. This is not the only bill that we're going to deal with this session. If I had my way, it would be. But at some point, one way or another, this bill will be off the agenda. I had told Senator Bromm that it was regrettable that he made this a committee...a Speaker's priority bill and was the first one up, and he thought everything had been worked out on the bill. So I don't know who said that.

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: It wasn't me.

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Schimek on this amendment.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes. Thank you. Mr. Speaker and members, I'm kind of at a point in the day where I have to confess I have trouble thinking of what I'm going to say next, because I'm not quite as verbose as...or knowledgeable or as erudite or whatever you want to say, as my friend, Senator Chambers, over there. And I know that we have hashed the issues over on this particular bill until you're all blue in the face from it and you could scream from listening to our voices. And I don't blame you one little bit. But, but I don't see any movement or any desire by the sponsor of this bill to work with us or to suggest other ideas. It is as if it's my way or the highway. And I don't find that to be a very congenial attitude, and so therefore I am forced to stand up here and bore you to death for five more minutes about an issue that you've already heard an
