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Omaha had his young son in the back of a pickup, he was obeying the speed limit. He was driving 25 miles an hour and, still, another vehicle ran a red light, hit him, knocked his son out of the pickup and ran over his son and killed him. That's the whole point of this bill, is to try to save some lives. Senator Chambers is very much correct when he says we shouldn't exempt anybody. I agree and I'd love to be able to do it like that. However, I know that I don't have the votes in this body to accomplish that. That's the sad truth of the matter. I think rural children are every bit as important as urban children. I think Boy Scouts are every bit as important, and their lives are important, as other children. But I'm being realistic and I'm taking whatever scraps I can get with this. And if I can get it with a rural amendment, then that's the way it has to be. My whole goal here is just to try to save some lives, and I will continue to do this and continue to oppose both of the amendments before us. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Aguilar. Senator Beutler, on the Chambers amendment to the Quandahl amendment.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Cudaback, members of the Legislature, I have nothing to say because I wanted to make the crucial point that controlling the speed of the other vehicle is the critical element, and I think obviously the fatal flaw in this particular amendment. So that point needs to be repeated about five times and I think that's all there is to it. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Beutler. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I would like to ask a question of Senator Aguilar, because it's his bill.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Aguilar, would you respond?

SENATOR AGUILAR: Yes, I will.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Aguilar, you heard what Senator Beutler said. Do you agree with what he said?
