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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, here's all that I want to say. Did you have the facts of that case? Because if there are facts that would show that what I'm suggesting is not true, then my opinion would be different.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: Well, I don't think I would be able to get the facts from the adjudicator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: I don't believe I could get that. I would if I could, Senator. But I would like to stress that 45 other states have a requalification process, and in those states, if you quit without good cause, you're not going to collect unemployment at all, not at all. So I think we're quite a bit more liberal than those states. Senator Beutler, you talked about the wife who leaves; her husband gets a better job. Now, when the husband got a better job, that's part of the unemployment process, he does collect unemployment insurance. But the wife that follows her husband to a different community or different state or whatever it may be, she does not collect, at this point, for unemployment. And, Senator Beutler, you say, well, why; why should she not? That makes fluidity in the work force. Well, I would ask you, why should that employer, that had a job, had a trained employee, had a good employee, was happy with the employee, wanted to keep the employee, why should he now have to hire a new employee, train another employee, plus pay the unemployment benefits...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: ...for that person that left? Why is that fair? Senator Bourne, you talked about the economic stimulus. I might ask you, if it is such an economic stimulus, why doesn't the state send out thousand-dollar bills to everybody and stimulate the economy? Why are we doing it on the backs of the employers? And when people in here talk about employers, they're all thinking of big employers. But the majority of employers in this state are small employers. They are small employers. They're the backbone of the economy in this state.
