day comes that that no longer is said, that such a notion is no longer entertained, then the Legislature will be moving in the direction that it ought to. This branch, believe it or not, has more power than the other two. We pass laws that govern the other two. With the exception of what the constitution cloaks them with in the nature of power, duties, responsibilities and so forth, we call the shots. But we are afraid to do those things as a Legislature that we ought to do. I don't say the Governor should have to come here wearing leather kneepads because we're going to make him crawl and genuflect all the way from his office to that door in the Rotunda before any of us will talk to him, but I'm saying that the Legislature can conduct itself in such a way that the Governor doesn't name a senator and say, get in here; or that one of the Governor's employees shouts at a senator. You all control the purse strings. The hand that feeds controls. Deep Throat said, during the Watergate fiasco, follow the money. The money is where everything is. Even though in one place the Bible said the love of money is the root of all evil, not money, the love of money, it said in another place money answereth all things. Senator Friend works in a bank, I think, so he's around a lot of money, but it's not his. And if he tried to make it his, he'd still be in a state facility but it would be different from the Legislature. We'd be visiting him on certain days, and people would be telling him what to wear, and when to come and when to go, and what he could do. They often say money can't buy happiness, but when you've seen impoverished people, you know that money can relieve a lot of misery.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And if we were as intent on relieving misery as we are in passing bills that can inflict misery, the whole society would be better. As Abraham Lincoln said, the better angels of people's nature could come into play, and you would never be cursed with somebody like me. Everything could just roll along smoothly. But until things change, as long as I'm here, I shall have to carry on in the way that I do. Thank you, Mr. President.
