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of safety, sanitation, and sterilization. And if you're following along, actually, lines 16 through 20, I believe, do remain the same. So basically, we have the same concepts. We have reworded it, I think, to make it clearer and are actually taking the examination of the competency, we are striking that and asking for evidence of training or experience satisfactory to the department to ensure the protection of the public. So I don't know if there are any questions. Hopefully, maybe Senator Bourne might have some comments. I might just ask Senator Bourne, would you like to comment on this new amendment?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Bourne.

SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you, Senator Stuhr. I would like to comment. It sounds like this amendment is what you and I had agreed to some days ago and I would like to read it. Your staff did prepare it or Senator Chambers or somebody, and I would like to read it again, but it is exactly what, I think, that you and I had agreed to and intended; that an individual that wants to do body art in this state shall be tested as it relates specifically to safety, sanitation, infection control practices, and that's it. Is that your understanding, Senator Stuhr?

SENATOR STUHR: Yes, it is.

SENATOR BOURNE: Okay. And then there will be some...there's provisions in the bill which would allow the Department of Health and Human Services to inspect a facility, see that it has running water, that it's clean, things of that nature. But again, we're not adding any extra regulation, no education requirements, no training requirements, no experience requirements. We're simply saying that you have to understand infection control and sterilization and things of that nature. Then that's absolutely something I would support and I thank you for getting us there. I would like to read the actual amendment again. Again, I did read it, but I want to see it on the screen and actually read it and fit it into the bill, just to make sure that it does what we intend for it to do. Because again, while there might be some regulation necessary, we don't want to overregulate. I did want to clarify for just one second, when I talked about the hepatitis being transmitted, I was talking
