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SENATOR BAKER: No.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: ...a license.

SENATOR BAKER: It gives them 45 days, if you'll read the bill, 45 days to rectify...

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Yeah.

SENATOR BAKER: ...this and then they can issue, you know, up to 45 days.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Have you had any dealings with the Social Security Administration, or even our Department of Motor Vehicles? I mean, 45 days is not a lot of time.

SENATOR BAKER: Yes, I've had experience of both.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: And I had consistently had the opportunity to deal with both administrations, and 45 days is not a sufficient amount of time. Senator Cudaback, I'll yield the rest of my time to the Chair.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Synowiecki. Senator Baker, on the motion to return.

SENATOR BAKER: I want...thank you, Senator Cudaback. I want to point out, out of that 997 applicants that did not resolve their problems with a Social Security card, we, if you recall on Select File, we gave them an option. They don't have to have a Social Security card if they can't provide one. And it's in the bill, it's there. It says if you can't provide a Social Security card, you may provide one other form of acceptable U.S.-based documentation, identification. So that, out of this 997, I don't see any statistics or any numbers that says how many of those people actually could not validate their Social Security card, but they very well...a good part of those people could very well have provided another form of state...a federally-recognized ID. So I think we're making a mountain, or trying to make a mountain out of a mole hole here and I really
