Kentucky, I just verbally told them how to get to the State Fair. It was so poorly marked my dad, who is normally just a whiz at directions, got lost because there were not sufficient signs to direct him even where...how to get to the State Fairgrounds. And we all kind of take it for granted when we go there. We know exactly the way to go. But for out-of-towners, even something as basic as being well-marked for how to get to the State Fair once you get into Lincoln, that's been lacking. So I think if Lincoln does pony up some bucks and make a contribution to this effort, perhaps they will be a little more thoughtful about what they are putting into it as a city and what they do gain from it in terms of tourism dollars. In earlier talks about the State Fair, I talked about her being a grandma on life support that the family members have got to decide what do we do this year. Do we pull the plug or do we leave grandma on life support and pray for a miracle? I kind of lean toward praying for a miracle and leaving her on a little longer. We got two kids here. We got us, and we got the state of Nebraska voters--two children making a decision about grandma, what to do with her. We both have an equal responsibility in the life of grandma. What do we do? I think grandma has something there that could be...a spark that could be fanned. I think there's a flame inside of grandma that could be brought on and fanned a little bit with a little bit of oxygen. You know, a little bit of care, little bit of prayer, I think we...I think grandma could come around. So...but she won't have the chance if the other child says pull the plug, by virtue of us not letting the other child decide. So we got two kids here. Let's give them each an equal voice. All we're asking is permission for the other child not to pull the plug on grandma. The other child deserves an opportunity to speak. Unfortunately, we're in a position, through a constitutional process, the only way that child gets an opportunity to speak is when the other child says they can. But we got an equal say. In my opinion, the people should be able to vote on it. I love the amendment. I think it's great. It only makes the bill better and it only ensures for more success of the State Fair. I think it's a prudent way to offer stewardship over the money we're proposing to put into the fair, and that is to ensure that Lincoln also has a bigger stake than they currently have in it.
