- A BILL FOR AN ACT relating to education; to amend section 79-1054, Revised Statutes Cumulative Supplement, 2020; to provide for
- behavioral health points of contact; to provide duties for the State
- Sometion at mouthin potines of contact, to provide duction for the state
- 4 Department of Education, the Division of Behavioral Health of the
- 5 Department of Health and Human Services, and school districts; to
- 6 provide for mental health first aid training; to change provisions
- 7 relating to education innovation grants; to harmonize provisions; to
- 8 provide operative dates; and to repeal the original section.
- 9 Be it enacted by the people of the State of Nebraska,

- 1 Section 1. (1) On or before August 1, 2023, each school district
- 2 <u>shall designate one or more behavioral health points of contact for each</u>
- 3 school building or other division as determined by the school district. A
- 4 behavioral health point of contact may be an administrator, a school
- 5 <u>nurse</u>, a school psychologist, or another designated person affiliated
- 6 with such school building or other division. Each behavioral health point
- 7 of contact shall have knowledge of community behavioral health service
- 8 providers and other resources available for students and families.
- 9 (2) On or before August 1, 2023, and on or before each August 1
- 10 thereafter, the State Department of Education, in consultation with the
- 11 Division of Behavioral Health of the Department of Health and Human
- 12 Services, shall provide each school district with a registry of state and
- 13 <u>local behavioral health resources available to work with students and</u>
- 14 <u>families</u> by <u>geographic</u> area. The <u>registry</u> shall be <u>updated</u> at <u>least</u>
- 15 <u>annually</u> and <u>include</u> resources for both school-based services and
- 16 services accessible by students' families outside of school.
- 17 (3) Each behavioral health point of contact shall coordinate access
- 18 to community behavioral health services for students and families and
- 19 <u>facilitate access to services during the school day at the school the</u>
- 20 <u>student attends</u>. Except as provided in section 43-2101, such facilitation
- 21 shall be approved by the student's parent or guardian.
- 22 (4) Before the beginning of school year 2023-24, and before the
- 23 beginning of each school year thereafter, each school district shall
- 24 report the designated behavioral health points of contact to the State
- 25 Department of Education.
- Sec. 2. (1) The State Department of Education shall establish a
- 27 mental health first aid training program for teachers and other personnel
- 28 <u>employed by a school district or an educational service unit</u>
- 29 participating in a grant under subsection (2) of section 79-1054.
- 30 (2) The mental health first aid training is to be delivered by
- 31 trainers who are properly certified by a national organization for

1 behavioral health to provide training meeting the requirements of this

- 2 <u>section</u>. The program shall also provide an opportunity for teachers and
- 3 other designated personnel to complete the training necessary to become
- 4 certified by a national organization for behavioral health to provide
- 5 mental health first aid training to other teachers and designated
- 6 personnel.
- 7 (3) Mental health first aid training shall include training on:
- 8 <u>(a) The skills, resources, and knowledge necessary to assist</u>
- 9 <u>students in crisis to connect with appropriate local mental health care</u>
- 10 services;
- 11 (b) Mental health resources, including the location of local
- 12 community mental health centers; and
- 13 (c) Action plans and protocols for referral to such resources.
- 14 (4) A recipient of mental health first aid training shall also
- 15 <u>receive instruction in preparation to:</u>
- 16 (a) Safely de-escalate crisis situations;
- 17 (b) Recognize the signs and symptoms of mental illness, including
- 18 such psychiatric conditions as major clinical depression and anxiety
- 19 <u>disorders; and</u>
- 20 <u>(c) Timely refer a student to mental health services in the early</u>
- 21 stages of the development of a mental disorder to avoid subsequent
- 22 behavioral health care and to enhance the effectiveness of mental health
- 23 <u>services. Except as provided in section 43-2101, any such referral shall</u>
- 24 <u>be approved by the student's parent or guardian.</u>
- 25 (5) It is the intent of the Legislature that the mental health first
- 26 <u>aid training program under this section shall be funded using lottery</u>
- 27 <u>funds under section 9-812.</u>
- Sec. 3. Section 79-1054, Revised Statutes Cumulative Supplement,
- 29 2020, is amended to read:
- 79-1054 (1)(a) This subsection applies until July 1, 2024.
- 31 (b) (1) The State Board of Education shall establish a competitive

- 1 innovation grant program with funding from the Nebraska Education
- 2 Improvement Fund pursuant to section 9-812. Grantees shall be a school
- 3 district, an educational service unit, or a combination of entities that
- 4 includes at least one school district or educational service unit. For
- 5 grantees that consist of a combination of entities, a participating
- 6 school district or educational service unit shall be designated to act as
- 7 the fiscal agent and administer the program funded by the grant. The
- 8 state board shall only award grants pursuant to applications that the
- 9 state board deems to be sufficiently innovative and to have a high chance
- 10 of success.
- 11 (c) (2) An application for a grant pursuant to this subsection (1)
- 12 of this section shall describe:
- 13 <u>(i)</u> <del>(a)</del> Specific measurable objectives for improving education
- 14 outcomes for early childhood students, elementary students, middle school
- 15 students, or high school students or for improving the transitions
- 16 between any successive stages of education or between education and the
- 17 workforce;
- 18 <u>(ii)</u> (b) The method for annually evaluating progress toward a
- 19 measurable objective, with a summative evaluation of progress submitted
- 20 to the state board and electronically to the Education Committee of the
- 21 Legislature on or before July 1, 2019;
- 22 (iii) (c) The potential for the project to be both scalable and
- 23 replicable; and
- 24 (iv) (d) Any cost savings that could be achieved by reductions in
- 25 other programs if the funded program is successful.
- 26  $\underline{\text{(d)}}$  Based on evaluations received on or before July 1, 2019, for
- 27 each grant, the State Board of Education shall recommend the grant
- 28 project as:
- 29 <u>(i)</u> (a) Representing a best practice;
- 30 (ii) (b) A model for a state-supported program; or
- 31 (iii) (c) A local issue for further study.

- 1 (e) (4) On or before December 1, 2017, and on or before December 1
- 2 of each year thereafter, the state board shall electronically submit a
- 3 report to the Clerk of the Legislature on all such grants, including, but
- 4 not limited to, the results of the evaluations for each grant. The state
- 5 board may adopt and promulgate rules and regulations to carry out this
- 6 <u>subsection</u> <del>section</del>, including, but not limited to, application
- 7 procedures, selection procedures, and annual evaluation reporting
- 8 procedures.
- 9 (2)(a) This subsection applies beginning July 1, 2024.
- 10 (b) The State Board of Education shall establish innovation grant
- 11 programs in areas, including, but not limited to, (i) mental health first
- 12 <u>aid, (ii) early literacy, (iii) quality instructional materials, (iv)</u>
- 13 personalized learning through digital education, or (v) other innovation
- 14 areas identified by the board. It is the intent of the Legislature that
- 15 <u>such grant programs shall be funded using lottery funds under section</u>
- 16 9-812. Grantees shall be a school district, an educational service unit,
- 17 or a combination of entities that includes at least one school district
- 18 or educational service unit.
- 19 (c) An application for participating in an innovation grant pursuant
- 20 to this subsection shall describe:
- 21 (i) Specific measurable objectives for improving education outcomes
- 22 for early childhood students, elementary students, middle school
- 23 <u>students, or high school students or for improving the transitions</u>
- 24 between any successive stages of education or between education and the
- 25 workforce;
- 26 <u>(ii) Participation in a method for annually evaluating progress</u>
- 27 <u>toward a measurable objective, with a summative evaluation of progress</u>
- 28 <u>submitted to the state board and electronically to the Education</u>
- 29 Committee of the Legislature on or before July 1 of each year;
- 30 (iii) The potential for the grant program to be both scalable and
- 31 replicable; and

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1 (iv) Any cost savings that could be achieved by reductions in other

- 2 programs if the grant program is successful.
- 3 (d) Based on evaluations received on or before July 1 of each year
- 4 for each grant program, the State Board of Education shall recommend the
- 5 grant program as:
- 6 (i) Representing a best practice;
- 7 (ii) A model for a state-supported program; or
- 8 <u>(iii) A local issue for further study.</u>
- 9 (e) On or before December 1 of each year, the state board shall
- 10 electronically submit a report to the Clerk of the Legislature on all
- 11 <u>such grant programs, including, but not limited to, the results of the</u>
- 12 <u>evaluations</u> for each grant program. The state board may adopt and
- 13 promulgate rules and regulations to carry out this subsection, including,
- 14 but not limited to, application procedures, selection procedures, and
- 15 annual evaluation reporting procedures.
- 16 (3) (5) The Department of Education Innovative Grant Fund is
- 17 created. The fund shall be administered by the State Department of
- 18 Education and shall consist of transfers pursuant to section 9-812,
- 19 repayments of grant funds, and interest payments received in the course
- 20 of administering this section. The fund shall be used to carry out this
- 21 section. Any money in the fund available for investment shall be invested
- 22 by the state investment officer pursuant to the Nebraska Capital
- 23 Expansion Act and the Nebraska State Funds Investment Act.
- 24 Sec. 4. Section 2 of this act becomes operative on July 1, 2024.
- 25 The other sections of this act become operative on their effective date.
- Sec. 5. Original section 79-1054, Revised Statutes Cumulative
- 27 Supplement, 2020, is repealed.
