Summary of purpose and/or changes:

LB 254 changes requirements for instruments recorded by the register of deeds.

Generally, all instruments submitted for recording will be on paper measuring eight and one-half inches by eleven inches, but not larger than 14 inches; will be printed in black ink on white paper without watermarks; will be sufficiently legible; will be signed in black or dark blue ink; and the name of each party will be typed or stamped beneath the original signature. The bill also establishes margin limits.

These requirements do not apply to: instruments signed before the effective date of this bill; instruments executed outside the United States; certified copies of instruments issued by governmental agencies; instruments signed by an original party who is incapacitated or deceased at the time of recoding; instruments formatted to meet court requirements; federal and state tax liens; and plats and surveys.

Any printed form accepted for recordation that does not comply with the provisions of this bill will not affect the validity of the recording.

Explanation of amendments: The committee amendment provides that the changes made by this legislation do not affect the duty of the register of deeds to file an instrument for recordation.
