A BILL

- FOR AN ACT relating to schools; to amend section 79-724, Reissue
 Revised Statutes of Nebraska; to change provisions
 relating to civics education; and to repeal the original section.
- 5 Be it enacted by the people of the State of Nebraska,

1 Section 1. Section 79-724, Reissue Revised Statutes of

- 2 Nebraska, is amended to read:
- 3 79-724 An informed, loyal, just, and patriotic citizenry
- 4 is necessary to a strong, stable, just, and prosperous America. Such
- 5 a citizenry necessitates that every member thereof be fully
- 6 acquainted with the nation's history and that he or she be in full
- 7 accord with our form of government and fully aware of the liberties,
- 8 opportunities, and advantages of which we are possessed and the
- 9 sacrifices and struggles of those through whose efforts these
- 10 benefits were gained. Since youth is the time most susceptible to the
- 11 acceptance of principles and doctrines that will influence men and
- 12 women throughout their lives, it is one of the first duties of our
- 13 educational system to conduct its activities, choose its textbooks,
- 14 and arrange its curriculum in such a way that the love of liberty,
- 15 justice, democracy, and America will be instilled in the hearts and
- 16 minds of the youth of the state.
- 17 (1) Every school board shall, at the beginning of each
- 18 school year, appoint from its members a committee of three, to be
- 19 known as the committee on Americanism. The committee on Americanism
- 20 shall:
- 21 (a) Carefully examine, inspect, and approve all textbooks
- 22 used in the teaching of American history and civil government in the
- 23 school. Such textbooks shall adequately stress the services of the
- 24 men and women who achieved our national independence, established our
- 25 constitutional government, and preserved our union and shall be so

1 written to include contributions by ethnic groups as to develop a

- 2 pride and respect for our institutions and not be a mere recital of
- 3 events and dates;
- 4 (b) Assure themselves as to the character of all teachers
- 5 employed and their knowledge and acceptance of the American form of
- 6 government; and
- 7 (c) Take all such other steps as will assure the carrying
- 8 out of the provisions of this section.
- 9 (2) All American history courses approved for grade
- 10 levels as provided by this section shall include and adequately
- 11 stress contributions of all ethnic groups (a) to the development and
- 12 growth of America into a great nation, (b) to art, music, education,
- 13 medicine, literature, science, politics, and government, and (c) to
- 14 the war services in all wars of this nation.
- 15 (3) All grades of all public, private, denominational,
- 16 and parochial schools, below the sixth grade, shall devote at least
- 17 one hour per week to exercises or teaching periods for the following
- 18 purpose:
- 19 (a) The recital of stories having to do with American
- 20 history or the deeds and exploits of American heroes;
- 21 (b) The singing of patriotic songs and the insistence
- 22 that every pupil memorize the Star-Spangled Banner and America; and
- 23 (c) The development of reverence for the flag and
- 24 instruction as to proper conduct in its presentation.
- 25 (4) In at least two of the three grades from the fifth

1 grade to the eighth grade in all public, private, denominational, and

- 2 parochial schools, at least three periods per week shall be set aside
- 3 to be devoted to the teaching of American history from approved
- 4 textbooks, taught in such a way as to make the course interesting and
- 5 attractive and to develop a love of country.
- 6 (5) In at least two grades of every high school, at least
- 7 three periods per week shall be devoted to the teaching of civics,
- 8 during which courses specific attention shall be given to the
- 9 following matters:
- 10 (a) The United States Constitution and the Constitution
- 11 of Nebraska;
- 12 (b) The benefits and advantages of our form of government
- 13 and the dangers and fallacies of Nazism, Communism, and similar
- 14 ideologies; and
- 15 (c) The duties of citizenship, including active
- 16 participation in the improvement of a citizen's community, state,
- 17 country, and world and the value and practice of civil discourse
- 18 <u>between opposing interests</u>.
- 19 (6) Appropriate patriotic exercises suitable to the
- 20 occasion shall be held under the direction of the superintendent in
- 21 every public, private, denominational, and parochial school on
- 22 Lincoln's birthday, Washington's birthday, Flag Day, Memorial Day,
- 23 and Veterans Day, or on the day preceding or following such holiday,
- 24 if the school is in session.
- 25 (7) Every school board, the State Board of Education, and

1 the superintendent of each school district in the state shall be held

- 2 directly responsible in the order named for carrying out this
- 3 section, and neglect thereof by any employee or appointed official
- 4 shall be considered a dereliction of duty and cause for dismissal.

- 6 of Nebraska, is repealed.
