A BILL

- 1 FOR AN ACT relating to education; to adopt the Teach for Nebraska
- 2 Program Act.
- 3 Be it enacted by the people of the State of Nebraska,

1 Section 1. This act shall be known and may be cited as

- 2 the Teach for Nebraska Program Act.
- 3 Sec. 2. <u>The Legislature finds that:</u>
- 4 (1) There is a need to increase academic opportunity for
- 5 highly motivated, underserved students and put them on the trajectory
- 6 of a successful college path and to inspire and develop the next
- 7 generation of teachers and educational leaders;
- 8 (2) Studies suggest that two million teachers will be
- 9 needed nationally over the next ten years, while traditional teacher
- 10 preparation programs will have a million teachers in the pipeline;
- 11 (3) Approximately fifty percent of all teachers at urban
- 12 and poverty-stricken public schools nationwide leave their positions
- in less than three years, not because they do not want to teach, but
- 14 because they are not always ready to teach;
- 15 (4) In the next ten years there will be shortages in
- 16 <u>subject areas such as mathematics, science, special education, world</u>
- 17 languages, bilingual education, and early childhood education; and
- 18 (5) There is a need to create a program to encourage
- 19 today's high school students to become tomorrow's teachers as
- 20 strategy toward resolving this shortfall and designed to provide
- 21 teachers the knowledge, skills, and disposition they need to make an
- 22 <u>immediate impact in the urban classroom.</u>
- Sec. 3. <u>The Legislature further finds that:</u>
- 24 (1) Middle school is a time of substantial academic,
- 25 <u>developmental</u>, and social change for students and during these years

1 students, particularly underserved students, shift their lives either

- 2 toward going to college or away from it;
- 3 (2) Research from Johns Hopkins University shows that,
- 4 during middle school grades, students in high-poverty environments
- 5 are either launched on the path to high school graduation or knocked
- 6 off-track;
- 7 (3) Research shows that two-thirds of the ninth grade
- 8 reading achievement gap between low-income and higher-income students
- 9 can be attributed to unequal access to summer learning opportunities;
- 10 (4) Nationally, only twenty-eight percent of low-income
- 11 students are enrolled in a college-preparatory curriculum during
- 12 their high school years, but research shows that bachelor's degree
- 13 <u>completion increases when students have a rigorous high school</u>
- 14 curriculum, particularly for low-income students;
- 15 (5) Research shows that underserved students are more
- 16 likely to fall off the path to college and that they and their
- 17 families are less likely to know about the repercussions of current
- 18 course choices on future class placements, to know about the
- 19 differences among high school curricular tracks, or to feel entitled
- 20 to request changes to higher-level courses for their children;
- 21 (6) Research shows that having peers who are planning to
- 22 <u>attend college can be even more important than parental encouragement</u>
- 23 and support. One study showed that students are four times more
- 24 <u>likely to enroll in college if their peers intend to enroll in</u>
- 25 college as well. Breakthrough creates peer groups among students and

1 their teachers where high academic achievement is expected and

- 2 attending college is the norm; and
- 3 (7) There is need to create a program that encourages
- 4 middle-school-age students to finish secondary school, attend
- 5 college, and become teachers.
- 6 Sec. 4. (1) The Teach for Nebraska Program is created.
- 7 The program shall be in the baccalaureate teacher education programs
- 8 <u>at the University of Nebraska at Kearney and the University of</u>
- 9 <u>Nebraska at Omaha.</u>
- 10 (2) The program shall consist of an intense six-week
- 11 summer session for eligible students who have completed either grade
- 12 <u>eight or grade eleven and shall consist of:</u>
- 13 (a) Students teaching students;
- 14 (b) Accelerated learning in English literature,
- 15 mathematics, science, social studies, and foreign language;
- 16 (c) Grade monitoring, tutoring, and ongoing college
- 17 preparatory activities;
- 18 <u>(d) College entrance examination preparation;</u>
- (e) Internship placements;
- 20 (f) Housing for participating students and teachers on
- 21 campus; and
- 22 (g) Other necessary academic support.
- 23 <u>(3) No tuition shall be charged for students</u>
- 24 participating in the Teach for Nebraska Program.
- 25 Sec. 5. (1) To be eligible to participate in the Teach

- 1 <u>for Nebraska Program, applicants shall:</u>
- 2 (a) Have completed either grade eight or grade eleven;
- 3 (b) Be a free lunch or free milk student as defined in
- 4 <u>section 79-1003;</u>
- 5 (c) Have a cumulative grade point average of 2.0 or
- 6 <u>higher on a 4.0 scale; and</u>
- 7 (d) Be enrolled for the upcoming school year in one or
- 8 more college preparatory courses.
- 9 (2) Applicants who meet the requirements of subsection
- 10 (1) of this section shall be selected based upon, but not limited to,
- 11 two teacher recommendations, an essay, and a personal interview.
- 12 Sec. 6. The University of Nebraska at Kearney and the
- 13 University of Nebraska at Omaha shall develop a process to track the
- 14 students who participate in the Teach for Nebraska Program and
- 15 provide an annual report to the Board of Regents of the University of
- 16 Nebraska, the Governor, and electronically to the Legislature,
- 17 showing how many participating students enroll in academically
- 18 rigorous middle-school and high school college-preparatory courses,
- 19 graduate on time from high school, and enroll in and graduate from
- 20 college.
- 21 Sec. 7. The Teach for Nebraska Fund is created. Any money
- 22 in the fund available for investment shall be invested by the state
- 23 <u>investment officer pursuant to the Nebraska Capital Expansion Act and</u>
- 24 <u>the Nebraska State Funds Investment Act.</u>
- 25 The purpose of the fund is to provide for the expenses of

1 students and teachers participating in the Teach for Nebraska

- 2 Program. Eligible expenses include books, materials, lunches, snacks,
- 3 field trips, tuition and fees for participating students, and
- 4 <u>salaries and expenses for participating teachers.</u>
- 6 <u>million dollars each fiscal year for fiscal years 2014-15 and 2015-16</u>
- 7 from the Excellence in Teaching Cash Fund to the Teach for Nebraska
- 8 Fund to carry out this section.
