2		Revised Statutes of Nebraska, sections 79-1011 and
3		79-1012, Revised Statutes Cumulative Supplement, 2012,
4		and sections 9-812, 79-1003, 79-1007.11, 79-1007.23,
5		79-1007.25, 79-1017.01, 79-1028.01, and 79-2306, Revised
6		Statutes Supplement, 2013; to change allocations from the
7		Education Innovation Fund; to change provisions relating
8		to certain allowances pursuant to the Tax Equity and
9		Educational Opportunities Support Act; to provide for
10		support payments relating to consolidations; to change
11		provisions relating to local system formula resources and
12		intent relating to early childhood education programs; to
13		harmonize provisions; to repeal the original sections;
14		and to declare an emergency.

15 Be it enacted by the people of the State of Nebraska,

1 Section 1. Section 9-812, Revised Statutes Supplement,

- 2 2013, is amended to read:
- 3 9-812 (1) All money received from the operation of
- 4 lottery games conducted pursuant to the State Lottery Act in Nebraska
- 5 shall be credited to the State Lottery Operation Trust Fund, which
- 6 fund is hereby created. All payments of the costs of establishing and
- 7 maintaining the lottery games shall be made from the State Lottery
- 8 Operation Cash Fund. In accordance with legislative appropriations,
- 9 money for payments for expenses of the division shall be transferred
- 10 from the State Lottery Operation Trust Fund to the State Lottery
- 11 Operation Cash Fund, which fund is hereby created. All money
- 12 necessary for the payment of lottery prizes shall be transferred from
- 13 the State Lottery Operation Trust Fund to the State Lottery Prize
- 14 Trust Fund, which fund is hereby created. The amount used for the
- 15 payment of lottery prizes shall not be less than forty percent of the
- 16 dollar amount of the lottery tickets which have been sold.
- 17 (2) A portion of the dollar amount of the lottery tickets
- 18 which have been sold on an annualized basis shall be transferred from
- 19 the State Lottery Operation Trust Fund to the Education Innovation
- 20 Fund, the Nebraska Opportunity Grant Fund, the Nebraska Education
- 21 Improvement Fund, the Nebraska Environmental Trust Fund, the Nebraska
- 22 State Fair Board, and the Compulsive Gamblers Assistance Fund as
- 23 provided in subsection (3) of this section. The dollar amount
- 24 transferred pursuant to this subsection shall equal the greater of
- 25 (a) the dollar amount transferred to the funds in fiscal year 2002-03

1 or (b) any amount which constitutes at least twenty-two percent and

- 2 no more than twenty-five percent of the dollar amount of the lottery
- 3 tickets which have been sold on an annualized basis. To the extent
- 4 that funds are available, the Tax Commissioner and director may
- 5 authorize a transfer exceeding twenty-five percent of the dollar
- 6 amount of the lottery tickets sold on an annualized basis.
- 7 (3) Of the money available to be transferred to the
- 8 Education Innovation Fund, the Nebraska Opportunity Grant Fund, the
- 9 Nebraska Education Improvement Fund, the Nebraska Environmental Trust
- 10 Fund, the Nebraska State Fair Board, and the Compulsive Gamblers
- 11 Assistance Fund:
- 12 (a) The first five hundred thousand dollars shall be
- 13 transferred to the Compulsive Gamblers Assistance Fund to be used as
- 14 provided in section 9-1006;
- 15 (b) Beginning July 1, 2016, forty-four and one-half
- 16 percent of the money remaining after the payment of prizes and
- 17 operating expenses and the initial transfer to the Compulsive
- 18 Gamblers Assistance Fund shall be transferred to the Nebraska
- 19 Education Improvement Fund;
- 20 (c) Through June 30, 2016, nineteen and three-fourths
- 21 percent of the money remaining after the payment of prizes and
- 22 operating expenses and the initial transfer to the Compulsive
- 23 Gamblers Assistance Fund shall be transferred to the Education
- 24 Innovation Fund;
- 25 (d) Through June 30, 2016, twenty-four and three-fourths

1 percent of the money remaining after the payment of prizes and

- 2 operating expenses and the initial transfer to the Compulsive
- 3 Gamblers Assistance Fund shall be transferred to the Nebraska
- 4 Opportunity Grant Fund;
- 5 (e) Forty-four and one-half percent of the money
- 6 remaining after the payment of prizes and operating expenses and the
- 7 initial transfer to the Compulsive Gamblers Assistance Fund shall be
- 8 transferred to the Nebraska Environmental Trust Fund to be used as
- 9 provided in the Nebraska Environmental Trust Act;
- 10 (f) Ten percent of the money remaining after the payment
- 11 of prizes and operating expenses and the initial transfer to the
- 12 Compulsive Gamblers Assistance Fund shall be transferred to the
- 13 Nebraska State Fair Board if the most populous city within the county
- 14 in which the fair is located provides matching funds equivalent to
- 15 ten percent of the funds available for transfer. Such matching funds
- 16 may be obtained from the city and any other private or public entity,
- 17 except that no portion of such matching funds shall be provided by
- 18 the state. If the Nebraska State Fair ceases operations, ten percent
- 19 of the money remaining after the payment of prizes and operating
- 20 expenses and the initial transfer to the Compulsive Gamblers
- 21 Assistance Fund shall be transferred to the General Fund; and
- 22 (g) One percent of the money remaining after the payment
- 23 of prizes and operating expenses and the initial transfer to the
- 24 Compulsive Gamblers Assistance Fund shall be transferred to the
- 25 Compulsive Gamblers Assistance Fund to be used as provided in section

1 9-1006.

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2 (4)(a) The Education Innovation Fund is created. At least 3 seventy-five percent of the lottery proceeds allocated to the 4 Education Innovation Fund shall be available for disbursement. 5 (b) For fiscal year 2012-13, the Education Innovation 6 Fund shall be allocated as follows: (i) The first forty five thousand 7 dollars shall be transferred to the Excellence in Teaching Cash Fund 8 to fund the Attracting Excellence to Teaching Program; (ii) the next 9 three million three hundred sixty five thousand nine hundred sixty-10 two dollars shall be distributed to school districts as grants 11 pursuant to the Early Childhood Education Grant Program; (iii) the 12 next two million one hundred seventy five thousand six hundred 13 seventy three dollars shall be distributed to local systems as grants 14 for approved accelerated or differentiated curriculum programs for 15 students identified as learners with high ability pursuant to section 16 79-1108.02; (iv) the next one hundred eight thousand one hundred 17 thirty-six dollars shall be used by the State Department of Education 18 for the development of an integrated early childhood, elementary, 19 secondary, and postsecondary student information system; (v) the next 20 four hundred fifty thousand dollars shall fund the Center for Student 21 Leadership and Extended Learning Act; (vi) the next one hundred 22 fourteen thousand six hundred twenty-nine dollars shall be used by 23 the department to fund the multicultural education program created 24 under section 79-720; (vii) the next one hundred twenty three

thousand four hundred sixty-eight dollars shall be used by the

1 department to employ persons to investigate and prosecute alleged 2 violations as provided in section 79-868; (viii) up to the next one 3 hundred sixty thousand dollars shall be used by the department to 4 implement section 79-759; (ix) the next twenty-seven thousand two 5 hundred dollars shall be used to fund the Interstate Compact on 6 Educational Opportunity for Military Children; (x) the next two 7 hundred thousand dollars shall be used to provide grants to establish 8 bridge programs pursuant to sections 79-1189 to 79-1195; and (xi) the 9 amount remaining shall be allocated, after administrative expenses, 10 for distance education equipment and incentives pursuant to sections 79-1336 and 79-1337. No funds received as allocations from the 11 12 Education Innovation Fund pursuant to this subdivision may be 13 obligated for payment to be made after June 30, 2016. 14 (c) (b) For fiscal year 2013-14, the Education Innovation 15 Fund shall be allocated as follows: (i) The first one million dollars 16 shall be transferred to the Excellence in Teaching Cash Fund to fund the Excellence in Teaching Act; (ii) the next allocation shall be 17 18 distributed to local systems as grants for approved accelerated or 19 differentiated curriculum programs for students identified 20 learners with high ability pursuant to section 79-1108.02 in an 21 aggregated amount up to the amount distributed in the prior fiscal 22 year for such purposes increased by the basic allowable growth rate pursuant to section 79-1025; (iii) up to the next one hundred sixty 23 thousand dollars shall be used by the State Department of Education 24 25 to implement section 79-759; (iv) the next one million seven hundred

fifty thousand dollars shall be allocated to early childhood 1 2 education grants awarded by the department pursuant to section 3 79-1103; (v) the next one million dollars shall be transferred to the 4 Early Childhood Education Endowment Cash Fund for use pursuant to 5 section 79-1104.02; (vi) the next two hundred thousand dollars shall be used to provide grants to establish bridge programs pursuant to 6 7 sections 79-1189 to 79-1195; (vii) the next ten thousand dollars 8 shall be used to fund the Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children; (viii) the next eighty-five 9 thousand five hundred fifty dollars shall be allocated to the State 10 Department of Education for distribution pursuant to section 79-2306; 11 12 (ix) the amount remaining shall be allocated, after and 13 administrative expenses, for distance education equipment and incentives pursuant to sections 79-1336 and 79-1337. No funds 14 15 received as allocations from the Education Innovation Fund pursuant 16 to this subdivision may be obligated for payment to be made after 17 June 30, 2016. (d) (c) For fiscal year 2014-15, the Education Innovation 18 19 Fund shall be allocated as follows: (i) The first one million dollars 20 shall be transferred to the School District Reorganization Fund; (ii) the next one million dollars shall be transferred to the Excellence 21 in Teaching Cash Fund to fund the Excellence in Teaching Act; (ii) 22 23 (iii) the next allocation shall be distributed to local systems as grants for approved accelerated or differentiated curriculum programs 24 25 for students identified as learners with high ability pursuant to

section 79-1108.02 in an aggregated amount up to 1 the amount 2 distributed in the prior fiscal year for such purposes increased by 3 the basic allowable growth rate pursuant to section 79-1025; (iii) 4 (iv) the next one million eight hundred fifty thousand dollars shall 5 be allocated to early childhood education grants awarded by the State Department of Education pursuant to section 79-1103; $\frac{(iv)}{(v)}$ the 6 7 next one million dollars shall be transferred to the Early Childhood 8 Education Endowment Cash Fund for use pursuant to section 79-1104.02; 9 $\frac{(v)}{(vi)}$ the next two hundred thousand dollars shall be used to provide grants to establish bridge programs pursuant to sections 10 79-1189 to 79-1195; (vi) (vii) the next ten thousand dollars shall be 11 12 used to fund the Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for 13 Military Children; and (vii) (viii) the amount remaining shall be 14 allocated, after administrative expenses, for distance education 15 equipment and incentives pursuant to sections 79-1336 and 79-1337. No 16 Except for funds transferred to the School District Reorganization Fund, Early Childhood Education Endowment Cash Fund, or the 17 department for early childhood education grants pursuant to section 18 79-1103, no funds received as allocations from the Education 19 20 Innovation Fund pursuant to this subdivision may be obligated for 21 payment to be made after June 30, 2016, and such funds received as 22 allocations from the Education Innovation Fund that have not been 23 used for their designated purpose as of such date shall be transferred to the Nebraska Education Improvement Fund on or before 24 <u>August 1, 2016</u>. 25

(e) (d) For fiscal year 2015-16, the Education Innovation 1 2 Fund shall be allocated as follows: (i) The first one million dollars 3 shall be transferred to the School District Reorganization Fund; (ii) the next one million dollars shall be transferred to the Excellence 4 5 in Teaching Cash Fund to fund the Excellence in Teaching Act; (ii) (iii) the next allocation shall be distributed to local systems as 6 7 grants for approved accelerated or differentiated curriculum programs 8 for students identified as learners with high ability pursuant to 9 section 79-1108.02 in an aggregated amount up to the amount distributed in the prior fiscal year for such purposes increased by 10 the basic allowable growth rate pursuant to section 79-1025; (iii) 11 12 (iv) the next one million nine hundred fifty thousand dollars shall 13 be allocated to early childhood education grants awarded by the State Department of Education pursuant to section 79-1103; $\frac{(iv)}{(v)}$ the 14 next one million dollars shall be transferred to the Early Childhood 15 Education Endowment Cash Fund for use pursuant to section 79-1104.02; 16 $\frac{(v)-(vi)}{(vi)}$ the next ten thousand dollars shall be used to fund the 17 Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children; 18 and (vi) (vii) the amount remaining shall be allocated, after 19 20 administrative expenses, for distance education equipment and incentives pursuant to sections 79-1336 and 79-1337. No-Except for 21 22 funds transferred to the School District Reorganization Fund, the Early Childhood Education Endowment Cash Fund, or the department for 23 early childhood education grants pursuant to section 79-1103, no 24 25 funds received as allocations from the Education Innovation Fund

1 pursuant to this subdivision may be obligated for payment to be made

- 2 after June 30, 2016, and funds received as allocations from the
- 3 Education Innovation Fund that have not been used for their
- 4 designated purpose as of such date shall be transferred to the
- 5 Nebraska Education Improvement Fund on or before August 1, 2016.
- $\frac{(f)-(e)}{(f)}$ The Education Innovation Fund terminates on June
- 7 30, 2016. Any money in the fund on such date shall be transferred to
- 8 the Nebraska Education Improvement Fund on such date.
- 9 (5) The Nebraska Education Improvement Fund is created.
- 10 The fund shall consist of money transferred pursuant to subsections
- 11 (3) and (4) of this section, money transferred pursuant to section
- 12 85-1920, and any other funds appropriated by the Legislature. Any
- 13 money in the fund available for investment shall be invested by the
- 14 state investment officer pursuant to the Nebraska Capital Expansion
- 15 Act and the Nebraska State Funds Investment Act.
- 16 (6) Any money in the State Lottery Operation Trust Fund,
