- 1 A BILL FOR AN ACT relating to education; to adopt the Expanded Learning
- 2 Opportunity Grant Program Act.
- 3 Be it enacted by the people of the State of Nebraska,

LB379 2015

1 Section 1. Sections 1 to 10 of this act shall be known and may be

- 2 <u>cited as the Expanded Learning Opportunity Grant Program Act.</u>
- 3 Sec. 2. The purpose of the Expanded Learning Opportunity Grant
- 4 Program Act is to promote academic achievement outside of school hours in
- 5 high-need school districts.
- 6 Sec. 3. For purposes of the Expanded Learning Opportunity Grant
- 7 Program Act:
- 8 (1) Community learning center has the definition found in 20 U.S.C.
- 9 7171(b)(1), as such section exists on January 1, 2015;
- 10 (2) Department means the State Department of Education;
- 11 (3) Expanded learning opportunity program means a school-community
- 12 partnership that provides participating elementary and secondary age
- 13 students and their families with programming and other support activities
- 14 and services after school and on weekends, holidays, and other hours when
- 15 school is not in session through a mix of programs and services that (a)
- 16 complement but do not duplicate elementary and secondary school day
- 17 learning and (b) create opportunities to strengthen school-community
- 18 partnerships that provide students and their families the supports they
- 19 <u>need to be successful in school; and</u>
- 20 (4) High-need school district means a school district in which forty
- 21 percent or more of the enrolled students qualify for free and reduced
- 22 price meals under the National School Lunch Program, 7 C.F.R. part 210,
- 23 as such regulations exist on January 1, 2015.
- 24 Sec. 4. The department shall establish and administer the Expanded
- 25 <u>Learning Opportunity Grant Program. The grant program shall provide</u>
- 26 grants to community-based organizations working in partnership with
- 27 <u>schools in high needs districts to provide expanded learning opportunity</u>
- 28 programs.
- 29 Sec. 5. The first priority of the Expanded Learning Opportunity
- 30 Grant Program is to continue existing 21st Century Community Learning
- 31 Centers funded by the federal 21st Century Community Learning Center

- 1 program pursuant to 20 U.S.C. 7171 et seq., as such sections exist on
- 2 January 1, 2015, in high-need school districts that have a record of
- 3 success. The second priority shall be support for new expanded learning
- 4 opportunity program development in areas of the state with a high
- 5 percentage of at-risk children that are not currently served by school-
- 6 based or school-linked expanded learning opportunity programs funded by
- 7 the federal 21st Century Community Learning Center program pursuant to 20
- 8 <u>U.S.C. 7171 et seq., as such sections exist on January 1, 2015.</u>
- 9 Sec. 6. (1) The department shall establish an application process
- 10 and timeline pursuant to which partner organizations may submit proposals
- 11 <u>for a grant under the Expanded Learning Opportunity Grant Program. Each</u>
- 12 proposal shall include:
- 13 <u>(a) A grant planning period;</u>
- 14 (b) An agreement to participate in periodic evaluations of the
- 15 expanded learning opportunity program, to be specified by the department;
- 16 (c) Evidence that the proposed expanded learning opportunity program
- 17 will be coordinated or contracted with existing programs;
- 18 (d) A plan to coordinate and use a combination of local, state,
- 19 philanthropic, and federal funding sources, including, but not limited
- 20 to, funding available through the federal No Child Left Behind Act of
- 21 2001, 20 U.S.C. 6301 et seq., as such act and sections exist on January
- 22 1, 2015. Funding provided by the Expanded Learning Opportunity Grant
- 23 Program shall be matched on a one-to-one basis by community or partner
- 24 <u>contributions;</u>
- 25 (e) A plan to use sliding fee scales and the funding sources
- 26 included in subdivision (d) of this subsection;
- 27 (f) An advisory body which includes families and community members;
- 28 (g) Appropriately qualified staff;
- 29 (h) An appropriate child-to-staff ratio;
- 30 (i) Compliance with minimum health and safety standards;
- 31 (j) A strong family development and support component, recognizing

- 1 the central role of parents in their children's development; and
- 2 (k) Developmentally and culturally appropriate practices and
- 3 assessments.
- 4 (2) The proposal shall demonstrate how the expanded learning
- 5 opportunity program will provide participating students with academic
- 6 enrichment and expanded learning opportunities that are high quality,
- 7 based on proven methods, if appropriate, and designed to complement
- 8 <u>students' regular academic programs. Such activities shall include two or</u>
- 9 more of the following:
- 10 (a) Core education subjects of reading, writing, mathematics, and
- 11 science;
- 12 (b) Academic enrichment learning programs, including provision of
- 13 <u>additional assistance to students to allow the students to improve their</u>
- 14 <u>academic achievement;</u>
- 15 (c) Science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM)
- 16 education;
- 17 (d) Remedial education activities;
- 18 <u>(e) Tutoring services, including, but not limited to, tutoring</u>
- 19 <u>services provided by senior citizen volunteers;</u>
- 20 <u>(f) Arts and music education;</u>
- 21 (g) Entrepreneurial education programs;
- 22 (h) Telecommunications and technology education programs;
- 23 (i) Programs for English language learners that emphasize language
- 24 skills and academic achievement;
- 25 (j) Mentoring programs;
- 26 (k) Recreational activities;
- 27 <u>(1) Expanded library service hours;</u>
- 28 (m) Programs that provide assistance to students who have been
- 29 <u>truant, suspended, or expelled to allow such students to improve their</u>
- 30 <u>academic achievement;</u>
- 31 (n) Drug abuse prevention and violence prevention programs;

- 1 (o) Character education programs;
- 2 (p) Health and nutritional services;
- 3 (q) Behavioral health counseling services; and
- 4 (r) Programs that promote parental involvement and family literacy.
- 5 (3) A proposal shall: (a) Demonstrate specifically how its
- 6 activities are expected to improve student academic achievement; (b)
- 7 demonstrate that its activities will be provided by organizations in
- 8 partnership with the school that have experience or the promise of
- 9 success in providing educational and related activities that will
- 10 complement and enhance the academic performance, achievement, and
- 11 positive development of the students; and (c) demonstrate that the
- 12 <u>expanded learning opportunity program aligns with the school district</u>
- 13 <u>learning objectives and behavioral codes. Nothing in this subsection</u>
- 14 <u>shall be construed to require an expanded learning opportunity program to</u>
- 15 provide academic services in specific subject areas.
- 16 (4) The department shall make an effort to fund expanded learning
- 17 opportunity programs in both rural and urban areas of the state. The
- 18 <u>department shall award grants to proposals that offer a broad array of</u>
- 19 services, programs, and activities.
- 20 Sec. 7. A school district participating in an expanded learning
- 21 opportunity program shall inform an authorized representative or designee
- 22 of each nonpublic school geographically located within each public school
- 23 <u>building's attendance area regarding potential participation in an</u>
- 24 <u>expanded learning opportunity program.</u>
- 25 Sec. 8. Grantees receiving funds pursuant to the Expanded Learning
- 26 <u>Opportunity Grant Program shall cooperate with evaluators and supervise</u>
- 27 <u>the administration and collection of student, teacher, parent, and</u>
- 28 collaboration surveys. Grantees shall also designate a qualified
- 29 evaluation professional or local evaluation support to ensure data
- 30 collection, perform annual self-assessments, monitor program progress,
- 31 and assist in developing local evaluation reports.

- 1 Sec. 9. The department shall provide a report evaluating the
- 2 programs to the Legislature by January 1 of each odd-numbered year. The
- 3 report submitted to the Legislature shall be submitted electronically. Up
- 4 to five percent of the total appropriation for the Expanded Learning
- 5 Opportunity Grant Program may be reserved by the department for
- 6 <u>administration</u>, <u>evaluation</u>, <u>and technical assistance for the expanded</u>
- 7 <u>learning opportunity programs</u>.
- 8 Sec. 10. The State Board of Education, in consultation with the
- 9 department, may adopt and promulgate rules and regulations to carry out
- 10 <u>the Expanded Learning Opportunity Grant Program Act.</u>
