## **LEGISLATIVE BILL 436**

- 1 A BILL FOR AN ACT relating to appropriations; to state intent to
- 2 appropriate funds for pediatric oral health services.
- 3 Be it enacted by the people of the State of Nebraska,

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Section 1. <u>It is the intent of the Legislature to appropriate</u>

additional funds from the General Fund to the University of Nebraska

Medical Center to establish a pilot program to expand pediatric dental
residents from the current enrollment of eight to ten residents.

5 The Legislature finds with an increasing demand for pediatric oral health services in underserved urban areas there is a need to establish a 6 7 three-year pilot program to analyze the benefits and costs of increasing state-supported pediatric dentistry residency positions at the University 8 9 of Nebraska Medical Center. The lack of access to specialty dental care 10 is a key cause of poor health outcomes for children of all ages in cities of the metropolitan class. This pilot program will add two pediatric 11 dental residents at a rate of one new resident per year starting in year 12 13 two of the pilot program.

The state-supported pediatric dental residents would be based at the 14 University of Nebraska Medical Center Pediatric Dental Clinic at 15 Children's Hospital in Omaha in order to maintain accreditation 16 17 standards. The pediatric dental residency program shall work closely with Omaha Public Schools, Charles Drew Health Center, and OneWorld Health 18 19 Centers in order to ensure that children from underserved areas of Omaha are able to access and establish a dental home. Increasing the number of 20 21 current residents from eight to ten will allow the program to partner 22 with such entities to provide the needed care. In order to fulfill this 23 mission, the University of Nebraska Medical Center will seek a 24 collaborator to provide care coordination such as translation and 25 transportation services, and add a pediatric dental faculty position and stipends to dental residents to provide services at federally qualified 26 27 health centers in an effort to address the most common barriers to 28 accessing dental care in the community.

After thirty-six months, the University of Nebraska Medical Center

College of Dentistry shall submit a progress report to the Legislature

and the Governor. The report shall include:

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1 (1) Tabulation of the number of children served and number of dental

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- 2 <u>homes established in an effort to document the improvement of oral health</u>
- 3 <u>outcomes for children in underserved communities;</u>
- 4 (2) Evidence of the impact on the pediatric dentistry workforce
- 5 providing care to underserved areas in Nebraska; and
- 6 (3) Estimated cost savings to the State of Nebraska. Baseline data
- 7 <u>shall be collected during year one of the pilot program and compared</u>
- 8 against the post-pilot data of the third year to provide an accurate
- 9 <u>measure of the effectiveness of the residency positions. The report to</u>
- 10 <u>the Legislature shall be submitted electronically.</u>
