- 1 A BILL FOR AN ACT relating to infants and juveniles; to amend section
- 2 43-3401, Reissue Revised Statutes of Nebraska, and section 43-3402,
- 3 Revised Statutes Cumulative Supplement, 2014; to adopt the Nebraska
- 4 Early Childhood Advantage Act; to harmonize provisions; and to
- 5 repeal the original sections.
- 6 Be it enacted by the people of the State of Nebraska,

1 Section 1. Sections 1 to 7 of this act shall be known and may be

- 2 cited as the Nebraska Early Childhood Advantage Act.
- 3 Sec. 2. For purposes of the Nebraska Early Childhood Advantage Act:
- 4 (1) Department means any state agency implementing home-visiting
- 5 programs; and
- 6 (2) Home-visiting program means a state-funded or state-administered
- 7 standards-based program that:
- 8 (a)(i) Is grounded in relevant, empirically based best practices and
- 9 knowledge that has comprehensive home-visiting standards that ensure
- 10 high-quality service delivery and continuous quality improvement and
- 11 <u>follows with fidelity a program manual or design that specifies the</u>
- 12 purpose, outcomes, duration, and frequency of services that constitute
- 13 <u>the program;</u>
- 14 (ii) Provides services to families of young children that elect to
- 15 participate;
- 16 (iii) Utilizes a variety of culturally relevant, developmentally
- 17 appropriate strategies;
- (iv) Connects families to additional services that support parents;
- 19 <u>(v) Promotes child well-being and prevents adverse childhood</u>
- 20 <u>outcomes;</u>
- 21 (vi) Promotes parental competence, child health, and good
- 22 development by building long-term relationships with families and
- 23 optimizing the relationships between parents and children in their home
- 24 environments; and
- 25 (vii) Provides for the collection and analysis of data about program
- 26 performance and outcomes at the state aggregate level, county aggregate
- 27 <u>level, provider level, and participant level.</u>
- 28 (b) Home-visiting program does not include:
- 29 (i) A one-time home visit or infrequent home visits with no
- 30 <u>intention of long-term services, such as a program that provides one home</u>
- 31 visit for all newborn children;

1 (ii) Services delivered through an individualized family service

- 2 plan or an individualized education program as defined in the federal
- 3 Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, 20 U.S.C. 1401, as such
- 4 <u>section existed on January 1, 2016;</u>
- 5 (iii) Services initiated by a report to the Division of Children and
- 6 Family Services of the Department of Health and Human Services or by
- 7 court order; or
- 8 (iv) Programs in which home visiting is supplemental to other
- 9 services.
- 10 Sec. 3. (1) Departments that provide home-visiting programs may
- 11 jointly adopt and promulgate rules and regulations by which the home-
- 12 <u>visiting programs shall operate. The departments shall provide a</u>
- 13 <u>framework for service delivery and accountability across all home-</u>
- 14 <u>visiting programs to promote a continuum of care that targets families at</u>
- 15 the greatest risk for experiencing adverse childhood outcomes.
- 16 (2) A home-visiting program shall provide face-to-face visits by
- 17 <u>specially trained parent educators to provide home-based family support</u>
- 18 services.
- 19 <u>(3) Home-visiting programs shall work in partnership to serve</u>
- 20 <u>children</u>, thereby maximizing the opportunities for families to receive
- 21 services that best fit their needs.
- 22 (4) A home-visiting program shall achieve two or more of the
- 23 <u>following:</u>
- 24 (a) Improve prenatal, maternal, infant, or child health outcomes,
- 25 including, but not limited to, indicators such as premature birth rates,
- 26 <u>substance abuse</u>, and tobacco use;
- 27 (b) Reduce entry into the child welfare system;
- (c) Improve positive parenting and relationship skills;
- 29 <u>(d) Improve parental self-sufficiency, including increased</u>
- 30 <u>employment and educational attainment;</u>
- 31 (e) Improve children's readiness to succeed in school; and

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- 1 (f) Improve children's social, emotional, cognitive, language, and
- 2 physical development, including efforts at early identification of
- 3 delays.
- 4 Sec. 4. A department shall work with community partners,
- 5 researchers, model developers, program providers, and interested private
- 6 entities to develop processes that provide for a greater ability to
- 7 collaborate and share best practices and information as necessary and
- 8 <u>appropriate</u>.
- 9 Sec. 5. When a department authorizes funds through payments,
- 10 contracts, or grants that are used for home-visiting programs, the
- 11 <u>funding agreement, contract, or grant shall include language regarding</u>
- 12 <u>home visiting that is consistent with the Nebraska Early Childhood</u>
- 13 Advantage Act.
- 14 Sec. 6. <u>Departments administering home-visiting programs, providers</u>
- 15 of home-visiting services, and experts in home-visiting program
- 16 evaluation shall:
- 17 (1) Jointly develop an outcomes measurement plan which includes
- 18 indicators related to the objectives established in section 3 of this act
- 19 <u>in order to monitor outcomes for children and families receiving home-</u>
- 20 <u>visiting programs and determine the efficiency of home-visiting program</u>
- 21 implementation;
- 22 (2) Complete and submit the outcomes measurement plan for state-
- 23 funded home-visiting programs by January 1, 2017, to the Governor and the
- 24 Clerk of the Legislature and complete and submit an updated plan every
- 25 five years thereafter. The plans shall be submitted electronically to the
- 26 Legislature; and
- 27 (3) <u>Develop a process for collecting and reporting outcomes measures</u>
- 28 to maintain privacy and security.
- 29 Sec. 7. <u>Beginning December 1, 2018, and annually thereafter, a</u>
- 30 department may allocate up to five percent of the home-visiting program's
- 31 annual budget to provide for administrative costs associated with

- 1 submitting an annual outcomes report to the Governor and the Clerk of the
- 2 <u>Legislature</u>. The report to the <u>Legislature</u> shall be submitted
- 3 <u>electronically</u>. The report shall include:
- 4 (1) Achieved outcomes as agreed upon and described in the previously
- 5 <u>submitted outcomes measurement plan pursuant to section 6 of this act for</u>
- 6 all home-visiting programs;
- 7 (2) Combined program data regarding (a) the cost per family served,
- 8 (b) the number of families served, (c) demographic data on families
- 9 served, and (d) the number and type of home-visiting programs that the
- 10 departments have funded; and
- 11 (3) Recommendations for quality improvements and future home-
- 12 <u>visiting program investments.</u>
- 13 Sec. 8. Section 43-3401, Reissue Revised Statutes of Nebraska, is
- 14 amended to read:
- 15 43-3401 The Early Childhood Interagency Coordinating Council is
- 16 created. The council shall advise and assist the collaborating agencies
- 17 in carrying out the provisions of the Early Intervention Act, <u>the</u>
- 18 <u>Nebraska Early Childhood Advantage Act,</u> the Quality Child Care Act,
- 19 sections 79-1101 to 79-1104, and other early childhood care and education
- 20 initiatives under state supervision. Membership and activities of the
- 21 council shall comply with all applicable provisions of federal law.
- 22 Members of the council shall be appointed by the Governor and shall
- 23 include, but not be limited to:
- 24 (1) Parents of children who require early intervention services,
- 25 early childhood special education, and other early childhood care and
- 26 education services; and
- 27 (2) Representatives of school districts, social services, health and
- 28 medical services, family child care and center-based early childhood care
- 29 and education programs, agencies providing training to staff of child
- 30 care programs, resource and referral agencies, mental health services,
- 31 developmental disabilities services, educational service units, Head

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1 Start, higher education, physicians, the Legislature, business persons,

- 2 and the collaborating agencies.
- 3 Terms of the members shall be for three years, and a member shall
- 4 not serve more than two consecutive three-year terms. Members shall be
- 5 reimbursed for their actual and necessary expenses, including child care
- 6 expenses, with funds provided for such purposes through the Early
- 7 Intervention Act, the Quality Child Care Act, and sections 79-1101 to
- 8 79-1104.
- 9 Members of the Nebraska Interagency Coordinating Council serving on
- 10 July 13, 2000, shall constitute the Early Childhood Interagency
- 11 Coordinating Council and shall serve for the remainder of their terms.
- 12 The Governor shall make additional appointments as required by this
- 13 section and to fill vacancies as needed. The Governor shall set the
- 14 initial terms of additional appointees to result in staggered terms for
- 15 members of the council. The Department of Health and Human Services and
- 16 the State Department of Education shall provide and coordinate staff
- 17 assistance to the council.
- 18 Sec. 9. Section 43-3402, Revised Statutes Cumulative Supplement,
- 19 2014, is amended to read:
- 20 43-3402 With respect to the Early Intervention Act, the Nebraska
- 21 <u>Early Childhood Advantage Act,</u> the Quality Child Care Act, and sections
- 22 79-1101 to 79-1104, the Early Childhood Interagency Coordinating Council
- 23 shall serve in an advisory capacity to state agencies responsible for
- 24 early childhood care, and education, and home-visiting programs as
- 25 <u>defined in section 2 of this act</u> including care for school-age children,
- 26 in order to:
- 27 (1) Promote the policies set forth in the Early Intervention Act,
- 28 the Nebraska Early Childhood Advantage Act, the Quality Child Care Act,
- 29 and sections 79-1101 to 79-1104;
- 30 (2) Facilitate collaboration with the federally administered Head
- 31 Start program;

- 1 (3) Make recommendations to the Department of Health and Human
- 2 Services, the State Department of Education, and other state agencies
- 3 responsible for the regulation or provision of early childhood care, and
- 4 education, and home-visiting programs on the needs, priorities, and
- 5 policies relating to such programs throughout the state;
- 6 (4) Make recommendations to the lead agency or agencies which
- 7 prepare and submit applications for federal funding;
- 8 (5) Review new or proposed revisions to rules and regulations
- 9 governing the registration or licensing of early childhood care and
- 10 education programs;
- 11 (6) Study and recommend additional resources for early childhood
- 12 care, and education, and home-visiting programs;—and
- 13 (7) Report biennially to the Governor and Legislature on the status
- 14 of early intervention and early childhood care and education in the
- 15 state. The report submitted to the Legislature shall be submitted
- 16 electronically. Such report shall include (a) the number of license
- 17 applications received under section 71-1911, (b) the number of such
- 18 licenses issued, (c) the number of such license applications denied, (d)
- 19 the number of complaints investigated regarding such licensees, (e) the
- 20 number of such licenses revoked, (f) the number and dollar amount of
- 21 civil penalties levied pursuant to section 71-1920, and (g) information
- 22 which may assist the Legislature in determining the extent of cooperation
- 23 provided to the Department of Health and Human Services by other state
- 24 and local agencies pursuant to section 71-1914; and -
- 25 (8) Report annually as required by section 7 of this act.
