It appears reasonable that NDCS would need to add some positions due to the requirements of this bill, but their estimate appears high. Additionally, the Legislative Fiscal Office (LFO) fiscal analyst understands that the custody positions listed in the above-table have high turn-over rates so it is possible that even if NDCS could fill such positions, they may not be able to retain them. LFO also understands that the behavioral and mental health positions are sometimes difficult to fill for the salary currently offered.

The Board of Parole - Parole Administration estimates no fiscal impact from this bill.

Explanation of Estimate:

LB 560 makes the following changes to the statutes regulating the use of restrictive housing:

- Amends 83-170(14) to define solitary confinement as <u>confinement in an isolated cell alone or with a cell</u> <u>mate, for an average of twenty-two or more hours per day, with limited human interaction or constructive</u> <u>activity and in an environment that ensures maximum control</u>"; In combination with the existing language in 83-4,114 prohibiting solitary confinement this appears to require all inmates in restrictive housing to be provided at least 2 hours per day out of cell time.
- Provides inmates with an opportunity to seek a review of the decision to place them in restrictive housing by the District Court in the county where the facility is located after 90 days of confinement in a calendar year.
- Provides that after July 1, 2017, no member of a vulnerable population, defined as an inmate under 18, pregnant, or diagnosed with a serious mental illness shall be placed in restrictive housing. Member of vulnerable populations may be placed in immediate segregation to protect staff, other inmate or themselves pending classification.
- Requires the Department to promulgate rules and regulations for vulnerable populations in restrictive housing.

The fiscal impact of LB 560 on the Department is significant. Defining solitary confinement as more than 22 hours per day in cell effectively requires the Department to provide at least two hours per day out of cell for all restrictive housing inmates as opposed to the current restrictive housing definition which is less than 24 hours out of cell time per week. This would require additional protective services staff at each of our facilities with restrictive housing units (NSP, TSCI, LCC, OCC, NCYF and NCCW) to provide escorts for these inmates while out of cell.

The language in section 3 prohibiting vulnerable populations from being housed in restrictive housing would require the secure mental health unit to provide at least 24 hours per week out of cell time. This would require additional protective services and behavioral health staff at the secure mental health unit.

The legislation creates restrictive housing appeals to the district court which would require a restrictive housing coordinator to gather the required information, process appeals, draft rules and regulations and prepare the annual report. If the attendance of the inmate is required, additional travel orders or equipment to provide video court appearances from restrictive housing will be needed. The additional positions required to meet the

provisions of LB 560 across all NDCS facilities by July 1, 2017 are outlined below:

4 Unit Case Workers28 Corporals6 Behavioral Health Case Workers2 Licensed Mental Health Practitioners (LMHP)1 Sergeant

1 Restrictive Housing Coordinator

In order to staff these positions 7 days a week, a relief factor of 1.75 is reflected for corporal, caseworker and behavioral health case worker and LMHP positions in the note below. Operating costs include uniforms and radios for all protective services staff and OCIO fees for all staff.
