Any Fiscal Notes received from state agencies and political subdivisions are attached following the Legislative Fiscal Analyst Estimate.

LB 617 would establish the Industrial Hemp Act and create the Industrial Hemp Commission, to be located in the Department of Agriculture for administrative purposes. The Commission would be directed to promote the cultivation of industrial hemp for research and development purposes, and for industrial purposes. Duties of the Commission would also include pursuing permits and waivers from the USDA, to oversee and analyze the growth of industrial hemp in Nebraska and to conduct seed research. The Commission would issue licenses for both research and commercial programs and collect application fees, to be deposited in the Industrial Hemp Program Fund. The Commission would also monitor the production of licensed industrial hemp and conduct testing for tetrahydrocannabinol.

It is estimated that initial costs to establish the agency would come from the General Fund transfers to the Industrial Hemp Program Fund. The amount of funding to be transferred would depend upon legislative funding decisions, and could be phased in during the initial years of the program as rules, regulations and procedures are established by the members of the Commission. Transfers in the initial one to two years of the program could range from \$250,000 to \$300,000.

When the Commission initiates full operations, expenses would include staffing expenses to accept and review license applications, to monitor production, and laboratory costs to conduct testing. Based upon the estimate of Department of Agriculture, licensing, monitoring and regulatory costs, laboratory costs and research and administration could total approximately \$300,000 per year. This estimate assumes regulatory authority over 100 producers, and costs would vary to some degree based upon the number of producers that are licensed.

While costs would be offset by licensing fees established for producers, it is not possible to estimate the amount of the fee that would be established by the Commission, or the number of licensees that would pay the fee. The Department of Agriculture estimate assumes a \$500 fee paid by 100 producers, resulting in \$50,000 in annual revenue. As a result, General Fund transfers would be necessary to offset program costs until a sufficient amount of fee revenue was received into the fund.

The Nebraska State Patrol estimates that there will be costs for the agency to conduct reviews of license applications, twice-a-year physical inspections of growing operations and overall law enforcement regulation. It is estimated that there would be minimal costs to the State Patrol until the Commission begins to accept license applications and industrial hemp is grown in the state. Increased costs would be based upon the timing of Commission decisions regarding the acceptance of license applications, how many license applications would be forwarded to the State Patrol for review, and the number of licensed growing operations in the state. The State Patrol states that 10 staff could be hired for this function at a cost of approximately \$1,000,000 per year. These costs are based upon the size of the Kentucky program, which has 500 people employed by licensed industrial hemp operations. Based upon the scale of program as assumed by the Department of Agriculture, it is estimated that initial year costs to the State Patrol would be lower, and could range from \$150,000 to \$200,000 per year. Because LB 617 provides no fee offset for State Patrol expenses, all costs would come from the General Fund.

Explanation of Estimate: This proposed bill known as the Industrial Hemp Act requires administrative support from the Department of Agriculture. A fund will be created in order to support the activities of the commission. The estimated \$50,000 cash fund is based on a registration fee of \$500 for 100 growers. There will be a fiscal impact on the Department.

The Department estimates a need for 1 FTE Ag Program Manager for administrative processes, decision making, education and outreach. The Department also estimates a need for 1 FTE Ag Inspection Specialist for field work including sampling and surveillance as well as education and outreach, .50 FTE Staff Assistant for administrative clerical, data entry and fee collections, .25 FTE Attorney, and .50 FTE Chemist II to receive, prepare, and analyze the samples as well as maintain and calibrate lab instruments in support of this legislation. For the first year, salary and benefit costs are shown for 6 months. Additional expenses would include an estimate of \$10,000 for travel, \$21,000 for lab testing fees, \$54,600 for lab startup costs, and \$10,000 for other operating costs for the first year. Furthermore, the Department is to establish a five year research program and to promote the research and development of industrial hemp and hemp products. The estimated cost for the research program is between \$50,000 and \$150,000 for the first year and the promotion of hemp and hemp products is between \$10,000 and \$50,000 for each year. Additional estimated expenses for the second year would include \$10,000 for travel, \$42,000 for lab testing fees, and \$25,000 for other operating costs. The lab testing fees are based on an estimate of \$140 per sample for 100 growers with 3 samples each.

Explanation of Estimate:

LB 617 allows for the adoption of the Industrial Hemp Act in the state of Nebraska. The bill has an effective date of 1/1/2018, therefore only 6 months of salaries, benefits, and certain operating expenses are reflected in the estimated costs. The bill allows the State Patrol to enter the premises on which industrial hemp is grown to conduct physical inspections of industrial hemp planted and grown by the applicant, and to ensure compliance with the requirements of the Industrial Hemp Act. The industrial hemp program will be overseen by the Industrial Hemp Commission. However, they do not have authority to perform law enforcement functions. It is the Agency's interpretation that enforcement of the rules and regulations established for the program will be the responsibility of the State Patrol. The State Patrol is also charged with enforcing the Uniform Controlled Substances Act. And while LB 617 excludes industrial hemp from being a controlled substance, ensuring that manufacturers are abiding by the regulations which result in its exclusion from being classified as marijuana will be an enforcement duty of the State Patrol. Other requirements of the Agency include the requirement to perform a state or national criminal history record information check for all persons applying for a license. The State Patrol is also charged with determining if all requirements relating to prior criminal convictions have been met and, on that basis, approving the applications for industrial hemp growers. The bill also provides that any industrial hemp that is found in the state at any location off the premises of an industrial hemp grower licensee shall be deemed to be contraband and shall be subject to seizure by the commission, the Nebraska State Patrol, or any law enforcement officer, if the person in possession of the industrial hemp does not have in his or her possession (1) proper licensing documents, (2) a bill of lading, or other proper documentation, demonstrating that industrial hemp was legally imported or is otherwise legally present in the state under applicable state and federal laws relating to industrial hemp. In order to enforce the provisions of the Act, the State Patrol estimates that it will need ten additional personnel to carry out enforcement activities. An Investigative Officer will be needed in each of the six troop areas. Research of national publications indicates that 500 people were employed in industrial hemp production in the state of Kentucky in 2015, and approximately 2,000 acres of hemp were planted in the state of Colorado in 2015. This was an increase of 1000% from only 200 acres in 2014, and is expected to continue to increase.
