18	<u>(2) Broadband facility agreement means an agreement between an</u>

20	electric utility infrastructure and electric utility easements for
21	<u>attached facilities;</u>
22	(3) Commercial broadband service means broadband service as such
23	term is defined in 7 U.S.C 950bb(b)(1), as such section existed on
24	<u>January 1, 2020, or broadband Internet service;</u>
25	(4)(a) Commercial broadband supplier means:
26	(i) A provider of commercial broadband service; or

27 (ii) A person that directly or indirectly sells, leases, or

1 otherwise transfers an attached facility or a right to install, operate, 2 maintain, or use an attached facility for another person's provision of 3 commercial broadband service or a person that intends to sell, lease, or 4 otherwise transfer an attached facility or a right to install, operate, 5 maintain, or use an attached facility; and (b) Commercial broadband supplier does not include an electric 6 7 utility; 8 (5) Electric utility means any entity referred to in subdivision (8) of section 70-601; 9 10 (6) Electric utility easement means a recorded or unrecorded easement, right-of-way, or similar right in or to real property, 11 including prescriptive rights, no matter how acquired, held by an 12 13 electric utility for the siting of electric utility infrastructure or for 14 the purpose of delivering electric service; 15 (7) Electric utility infrastructure means electric utility poles, structures, or other facilities used for the distribution of electric 16 17 service and street lighting, but does not include poles, structures, or other facilities used for electric transmission service; 18 19 (8) Notice means a written letter substantially complying with the 20 requirements set forth in subdivision (2)(b) of section 4 of this act, 21 which notice shall be deemed delivered on the date postmarked or 22 otherwise time stamped; 23 (9) Person means an individual, a firm, a partnership, a company, a corporation, a trust, a limited liability company, an association, a 24 25 joint venture, or any other legal entity; and 26 (10) Property owner means a person with a recorded interest in real property upon which an electric utility easement is located. 27 28 Sec. 4. (1) An electric utility and a commercial broadband supplier 29 may enter into a broadband facility agreement for the use of an electric 30 utility easement or electric utility infrastructure, or both, to: 31 (a) Install, maintain, or own, or permit any commercial broadband -2-

1	supplier to install, maintain, or own, an attached facility for operation
2	by a commercial broadband supplier in providing commercial broadband
3	service; and
4	<u>(b) Lease or otherwise provide to a commercial broadband supplier</u>
5	any excess capacity of attached facilities for purposes of providing

7	<u>(2)(a) A broadband facility agreement shall contain one of the</u>
8	following with respect to the use of any electric utility easement:
9	<u>(i) A statement that the electric utility has the legal right to</u>
10	authorize the use of the electric utility easement for commercial
11	broadband facilities;
12	<u>(ii) A statement that the commercial broadband supplier has</u>
13	compensated property owners for the use of the electric utility easement
14	for commercial broadband facilities pursuant to subsection (5) of this
15	<u>section; or</u>
16	<u>(iii) A statement that the electric utility has given notice to</u>
17	property owners pursuant to subdivision (2)(b) of this section and the
18	time for making a claim has expired.
19	(b) Notice pursuant to this subsection shall:
20	<u>(i) Be sent by certified mail from or on behalf of the electric</u>
21	utility to the property owner at each of the following, as applicable:
22	<u>(A) The last-known address for the property owner based on the</u>
23	electric utility's records; and
24	(B) The address listed for the property owner in the records of the
25	office of the county assessor;
26	(ii) Include the name, address, telephone number, and named point of
27	contact for the electric utility and, if delivered by a commercial
28	broadband supplier designated by the electric utility, the name, address,
29	telephone number, and named point of contact for the designated
30	<u>commercial broadband supplier;</u>
31	<u>(iii) Include the recording number, if any, of the electric utility</u>

1 easement or recorded memorandum of the electric utility easement; 2 (iv) Include: 3 (A) A reference to the Broadband Internet Service Infrastructure 4 Act; and 5 (B) A statement that the electric utility intends to enter into a broadband facility agreement, within ninety days after the notice is 6 7 delivered, for the use of the electric utility easement with the 8 commercial broadband supplier named in the notice; 9 (v) Give an estimated time for the start of installation or construction with regard to any new installation or construction that is 10 11 to occur in connection with the broadband facility agreement; and 12 (vi) Include a statement regarding the statute of limitations for 13 the property owner to file a claim with respect to the electric utility's 14 exercise of action. 15 (3) The terms and conditions of a written electric utility easement apply to the use of the electric utility easement for commercial 16 17 broadband facilities pursuant to a broadband facility agreement. A prohibition on aboveground electric utility infrastructure contained 18 19 within a written electric utility easement constitutes a prohibition on 20 aboveground attached facilities. An electric utility or its designated 21 commercial broadband supplier shall comply with any notice requirements 22 contained in a written electric utility easement held by the electric 23 utility relating to entering the real property subject to the electric 24 utility easement or commencing any construction or installation on the 25 real property. 26 (4) Nothing in this section requires an electric utility to comply 27 with subdivision (2)(b) of this section in order to take any action or exercise any rights under an electric utility easement that is already 28

29 permitted within the scope of the electric utility easement. An electric 30 utility easement shall be liberally construed in favor of its use for

31 commercial broadband facilities pursuant to a broadband facility

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2	<u>(5) If, within ninety days after a notice pursuant to this section</u>
3	is sent by an electric utility or a designated commercial broadband
4	supplier acting on the electric utility's behalf, a property owner
5	submits a written claim for compensation relating to the use of an
6	electric utility easement in connection with a broadband facility
7	agreement, then the commercial broadband supplier, through communications
8	handled by the electric utility, shall be responsible for the payment of
9	compensation to the property owner for such claim, and the electric
10	utility shall cooperate with the commercial broadband supplier in
11	connection with the resolution of the claim.
12	<u>(6) The electric utility shall not be required to enter into a</u>
13	broadband facility agreement until one of the following events occurs:
14	(a) The time period set forth in subsection (5) of this section has

27	commercial broadband supplier concerning the use of an electric utility
28	easement for commercial broadband facilities pursuant to a broadband
29	facility agreement may be brought by or on behalf of a property owner
30	more than two years after the later of:

- 31 (i) The operative date of this section; or

1	<u>(ii) The date of mailing of notice by an electric utility or a</u>
2	designated commercial broadband supplier acting on the electric utility's
3	behalf pursuant to subsection (5) of section 4 of this act.
4	(b) Subdivision (1)(a) of this section does not apply to a cause of
5	action based on:
6	<u>(i) Physical damage to property;</u>
7	<u>(ii) Injury to natural persons; or</u>

9	easement as the terms and conditions apply in accordance with subsection

14	applies shall not be brought against a commercial broadband supplier for

16	electric utility under subdivision (2)(b) of section 4 of this act.
17	Nothing in this subsection prohibits an electric utility and a commercial
18	broadband supplier from contracting to allocate liability for notice
19	required under subdivision (2)(b) of section 4 of this act.
20	<u>(3) If a property owner brings a trespass claim, inverse</u>
21	condemnation claim, or any other claim or cause of action to which
22	subdivision (1)(a) of this section applies for an electric utility's or
23	commercial broadband supplier's performance of actions described in
24	subdivision (1)(a) or (1)(b) of section 4 of this act, the following
25	applies to the claim or cause of action:
26	<u>(a) The measure of damages for all claims or causes of action to</u>
27	which subdivision (1)(a) of this section applies, taken together, is the
28	fair market value of the reduction in value of the property owner's
29	interest in the real property. In determining or providing the fair
30	<u>market value under this subdivision (a):</u>

31 (i) The following shall not be used and are not admissible as

1 <u>evidence in any proceeding:</u>

2 (A) Profits, fees, or revenue derived from the attached facilities;

4 (B) The rental value of the real property interest or the electric
5 utility easement, including the rental value of any attached facilities
6 or an assembled broadband corridor; and

7 <u>(ii) Consideration shall be given to any increase in value to the</u> 8 <u>real property interest resulting from the availability of commercial</u> 9 <u>broadband service to the real property underlying the real property</u> 10 <u>interest that arises from the installation of attached facilities;</u>

11 (b) The property owner shall make reasonable accommodations for the 12 electric utility or commercial broadband supplier to perform an appraisal or inspection of the real property within ninety days following any 13 14 written request for an appraisal or inspection. If a property owner fails 15 to make such accommodations, the electric utility or commercial broadband 16 supplier has no further liability to the property owner with respect to 17 such claim or cause of action. The electric utility or commercial broadband supplier shall promptly provide to the property owner a copy of 18 19 any appraisal performed pursuant to this subdivision (b);

20 (c) Any damages for any claims or causes of action to which
 21 subdivision (1)(a) of this section applies:

22 (i) Are limited to those damages that existed at the time the 23 electric utility or commercial broadband supplier first performed the 24 actions; and

25 (ii) Shall not be deemed to continue, accrue, or accumulate; and

26 (d) With regard to a claim or cause of action to which subdivision
 27 (1)(a) of this section applies:

(i) A property owner is not entitled to reimbursement from an
 electric utility or commercial broadband supplier for the cost of any
 appraisal, attorney's fees, or award for special, consequential,
 indirect, or punitive damages; and

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1	(ii) For purposes of this subdivision (d), any action or failure to
2	act by an electric utility or a commercial broadband supplier in
3	furtherance of the electric utility's or commercial broadband supplier's

6	(4) By accepting a damage award for any claim or cause of action to
7	which subdivision (1)(a) of this section applies, a property owner shall
8	be deemed to have granted an increase in the scope of the electric
9	utility easement, equal in duration to the term of the electric utility
10	easement and subject to this section, to the extent of the property
11	<u>owner's rights in the real property, for all of the uses of the real</u>
12	property and actions set forth in subsection (1) of section 4 of this
13	<u>act.</u>
14	Sec. 6. <u>(1) In entering into a broadband facility agreement, an</u>
15	<u>electric utility shall:</u>
16	<u>(a) Not discriminate among commercial broadband suppliers in</u>
17	offering or granting rights to install or attach any attached facilities;
18	<u>or</u>
19	<u>(b) Charge fees that are nondiscriminatory among commercial</u>
20	broadband suppliers for a substantially similar lease or use of the
21	capacity of attached facilities owned or controlled by the electric
22	utility, but only to the extent an electric utility chooses, in its sole
23	discretion, to offer the lease or use to a particular commercial
24	broadband supplier.
25	(2) Nothing in this section requires an electric utility to offer or
26	grant a right to access or use an electric utility easement or to use
27	attached facilities or electric utility infrastructure owned or
28	controlled by the electric utility in a manner that would, in the
29	electric utility's sole discretion, materially interfere with the
30	electric utility's construction, maintenance, or use of any electric

31 <u>utility infrastructure for the provision of electric service.</u>

1	(3) Nothing in the Broadband Internet Service Infrastructure Act:
2	<u>(a) Is intended to subject an electric utility to regulation by the</u>
3	Federal Communications Commission;
4	<u>(b) Constitutes an exercise of, or an obligation or intention to</u>
5	exercise, the right of the state under 47 U.S.C. 224 (c), as such section
6	existed on January 1, 2020, to regulate the rates, terms, and conditions
7	for pole attachments as defined in 47 U.S.C. 224 (a)(4), as such section
8	<u>existed on January 1, 2020;</u>
9	<u>(c) Constitutes a certification, or an obligation or intention to</u>
10	certify, to the Federal Communications Commission under 47 U.S.C. 224, as
11	such section existed on January 1, 2020;
12	(d) Prevents the parties involved from filing a claim or cause of
13	action in any court of competent jurisdiction for any dispute arising
14	under the Broadband Internet Service Infrastructure Act; or
15	(e) In any way affects the authority of electric utilities to enter
16	into agreements with any party, outside the requirements of the Broadband
17	Internet Service Infrastructure Act, relating to the use of its easements
18	<u>or electric system facilities.</u>
19	Sec. 7. The Broadband Internet Service Infrastructure Act does not
20	apply to railroad right-of-way or electric utility easements in or to
21	railroad right-of-way property. Crossings of railroad rights-of-way by
22	telecommunications carriers are governed by section 86-164.
23	Sec. 8. <u>(1) It is the intent of the Legislature to encourage local</u>
24	and regional broadband planning and to encourage public-private
25	partnerships to enhance broadband services in unserved and underserved
26	<u>areas of the state.</u>
27	(2) The position of state broadband coordinator is created. The
28	position shall be located in the office of Chief Information Officer. The
29	<u>coordinator shall:</u>
30	<u>(a) Encourage each county or region comprising a group of counties</u>
31	to appoint a broadband coordinator to facilitate broadband planning and

17	<u>July 1, 2021, the program shall receive funding from the Nebraska</u>
18	Telecommunications Universal Service Fund to provide incentives for fiber
19	optic cable to be constructed to benefit public libraries.
20	<u>(2) The commission shall establish criteria and priorities for</u>
21	funding by establishing a support mechanism to deploy fiber optic cable
22	for the benefit of public library access to E-Rate special construction

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Sec. 11. Section 86-127, Reissue Revised Statutes of Nebraska, is
 amended to read:

3 86-127 (1) One of the goals of the federal Telecommunications Act of 1996, as such act existed on January 1, 2002, is to foster competition 4 5 among telephone companies. Section 271 of the federal act (a) establishes 6 specific incentives, procedures, and requirements for regional Bell 7 operating companies to offer inter-LATA interexchange service and (b) requires the Public Service Commission to monitor the competitive 8 9 performance of a regional Bell operating company and to consult with the Federal Communications Commission regarding such activities. 10

11 (2) The Nebraska Competitive Telephone Marketplace Fund is created. 12 The Public Service Commission may accept, and the fund shall consist of, any voluntary performance payments received from a regional Bell 13 14 operating company. The fund shall be used by the commission for expenses 15 related to the monitoring of compliance with section 271 of the federal act.  megabits per second and a minimum upload speed of three megabits per

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1 second or higher speeds, as determined by the Public Service Commission;

(a) The commission shall establish a safe harbor range of market
 rates for all dark fiber leases using a competitive price determination
 comparison. When conducting a competitive price determination comparison,

the commission, in its discretion, shall use rate schedules, interconnection agreements, or other documents within its regulatory oversight and shall gather other market rate information as deemed necessary. If a lease utilizes rates within the safe harbor range, such rates shall be deemed approved. Any other term of the lease may be contested pursuant to subdivision (3)(b) of this section; and

7 (b) Fifty percent of the profit earned by the agency or political subdivision under a lease of dark fiber leased to serve a served location 8 9 shall be remitted to the State Treasurer for credit to the Nebraska Telecommunications Universal Service Fund. For purposes of this 10 11 subdivision, profit earned by the agency or political subdivision means 12 the lease price less the cost of infrastructure deployment. This subdivision does not apply to a lease of dark fiber leased to serve 13 14 unserved locations.

17 (a) The commission shall not approve any lease price which is less 18 than the market rate for leasing such fiber as determined by the commission. The market rate is the price associated with similar 19 20 unbundled network elements that may be available from the incumbent local 21 exchange carrier or the price of any other private entity leasing dark 22 fiber optic facilities serving the same or similar territory where the 23 leased equipment is located. Before entering into a lease, each agency or 24 political subdivision shall file a request with the commission for a 25 competitive price comparison to determine the market rate. When 26 conducting a competitive price comparison, the commission in its 27 discretion shall use rate schedules, interconnection agreements, or other 28 documents within its regulatory oversight and shall gather other market 29 rate information as deemed necessary;

30 (b) The commission shall not approve any lease price which is agreed
 31 upon by the agency or political subdivision and the lessee unless the

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lease requires that the agency or political subdivision be solely
 responsible for the maintenance of its dark fiber and that the lessee be

responsible, on a pro rata basis, for any such maintenance costs; and

(c) The commission shall not approve any lease unless fifty percent 4 5 of the profit earned by the agency or political subdivision under the 6 lease is remitted to the Nebraska Internet Enhancement Fund. Profit 7 earned by the agency or political subdivision is the lease price less the 8 cost of infrastructure overbuilding. Before entering into a lease, each 9 agency or political subdivision shall file a request with the commission 10 to determine the cost of overbuilding its fiber optic infrastructure. 22 86-579 The Nebraska Internet Enhancement Fund is created. The fund 23 shall be used to provide financial assistance to install and deliver 24 broadband or other advanced telecommunications infrastructure and service throughout the state. It is the intent of the Legislature that two 25 26 hundred fifty thousand dollars shall be appropriated to the fund to be 27 used for startup costs and seed money for FY2001-02. The Public Service Commission may receive gifts, contributions, property, and equipment from 28 29 public and private sources for purposes of the fund. The fund shall 30 consist of money appropriated by the Legislature, any money transferred pursuant to section 86-127, and gifts, grants, or bequests from any 31

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1 source_{τ} including money remitted to the fund pursuant to section 86-577 2 and any other federal, state, public, and private sources. Money in the 3 fund shall be distributed by the commission pursuant to section 86-580. Transfers from the fund to the General Fund may be made at the direction 4 5 of the Legislature. Any money in the Nebraska Internet Enhancement Fund available for investment shall be invested by the state investment 6 7 officer pursuant to the Nebraska Capital Expansion Act and the Nebraska 8 State Funds Investment Act. The fund terminates on June 30, 2021, and the 9 State Treasurer shall transfer any unencumbered money in the fund on such date to the Nebraska Telecommunications Universal Service Fund. 10

11 The State Treasurer shall transfer one hundred thousand dollars from 12 the Nebraska Internet Enhancement Fund to the General Fund on or before 13 July 15, 2003.

14 The State Treasurer shall transfer fifty thousand dollars from the 15 Nebraska Internet Enhancement Fund to the Rural Broadband Task Force Fund 16 on or before July 15, 2018.

Sec. 14. Section 86-1102, Revised Statutes Cumulative Supplement,2018, is amended to read:

86-1102 (1) The Rural Broadband Task Force is hereby created. Task 19 20 force members shall include the chairperson of the Transportation and 21 Telecommunications Committee of the Legislature and a member of the 22 Legislature selected by the Executive Board of the Legislative Council 23 who shall both serve as nonvoting, ex officio members, a member of the 24 Public Service Commission who shall be selected by the chairperson of such commission, the chairperson of the Nebraska Information Technology 25 26 Commission or his or her designee who shall act as chairperson of the 27 task force, the Director of Economic Development or his or her designee, the Director of Agriculture or his or her designee, and the following 28 29 members to be appointed by the Governor: A representative of the 30 agribusiness community, a representative of the Nebraska business community, a representative of the regulated wireline telecommunications 31

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industry, a representative of the wireless telecommunications industry, a representative of the public power industry, a representative of health care providers, a representative of Nebraska postsecondary educational institutions, and a representative of rural schools offering kindergarten through grade twelve. The members appointed by the Governor shall serve for a term of two years and may be reappointed.

7 (2) The task force may appoint advisory groups to assist the task 8 force in providing technical expertise and advice on any issue. The 9 advisory groups may be composed of representatives of stakeholder groups which may include, but not necessarily be limited to, representatives 10 11 from small and large wireline companies, wireless companies, public power 12 districts, electric cooperative corporations, cable television companies, Internet service providers, low-income telecommunications and electric 13 14 utility customers, health care providers, and representatives of 15 educational sectors. No compensation or expense reimbursement shall be provided to any member of any advisory group appointed by the task force. 16

17 (3) The Nebraska Information Technology Commission shall provide 18 staff assistance to the task force in consultation with staff from the 19 Public Service Commission and other interested parties. The task force 20 may hire consultants to assist in carrying out its duties. The task force 21 shall review issues relating to availability, adoption, and affordability 22 of broadband services in rural areas of Nebraska. In particular, the task 23 force shall:

(a) Determine how Nebraska rural areas compare to neighboring states
and the rest of the nation in average download and upload speeds and in
subscription rates to higher speed tiers, when available;

(b) Examine the role of the Nebraska Telecommunications Universal
Service Fund in bringing comparable and affordable broadband services to
rural residents and any effect of the fund in deterring or delaying
capital formation, broadband competition, and broadband deployment;

31 (c) Review the feasibility of alternative technologies and providers

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1 in accelerating access to faster and more reliable broadband service for 2 rural residents;

3 (d) Examine alternatives for deployment of broadband services to 4 areas that remain unserved or underserved, such as reverse auction 5 programs described in section 86-330, public-private partnerships, 6 funding for competitive deployment, and other measures, and make 7 recommendations to the Public Service Commission to encourage deployment 8 in such areas;

9 (e) Recommend state policies to effectively utilize state universal 10 service fund dollars to leverage federal universal service fund support 11 and other federal funding;

(f) Make recommendations to the Governor and Legislature as to the most effective and efficient ways that federal broadband rural infrastructure funds received after July 1, 2018, should be expended if such funds become available; and

16 (g) Determine other issues that may be pertinent to the purpose of 17 the task force.

(4) Task force members shall serve on the task force without
compensation but shall be entitled to receive reimbursement for any
actual expenses incurred for such service as provided in sections 81-1174
to 81-1177.

(5) The task force shall meet at the call of the chairperson and shall present its findings in a report to the Executive Board of the Legislative Council no later than November 1, 2019, and by November 1 every odd-numbered year thereafter. The report shall be submitted electronically.

(6) For purposes of this section, broadband services means highspeed telecommunications capability at a minimum download speed of twenty-five megabits per second and a minimum upload speed of three megabits per second, and that enables users to originate and receive high-quality voice, data, and video telecommunications using any

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1 technology.

Sec. 15. Section 8 of this act becomes operative on July 1, 2022.
The other sections of this act become operative on their effective date.
