A BILL FOR AN ACT relating to soil; to amend section 81-2,162.27, Revised
 Statutes Cumulative Supplement, 2018; to create the Healthy Soils
 Task Force; to provide powers and duties; to require a report; to
 provide for termination; to add a use for the Fertilizers and Soil
 Conditioners Administrative Fund; to repeal the original section;
 and to declare an emergency.

7 Be it enacted by the people of the State of Nebraska,

1	Section 1. <u>The Legislature finds that:</u>
2	(1) Healthy soils are a limited natural resource and fundamental for
3	<u>healthy and sustainable food production. Improving soil health means</u>
4	increasing soil's organic matter and diversifying its microbial activity
5	to enhance agricultural productivity and environmental resilience. A
6	commitment to healthy and productive soils and clean water is critical as
7	world population and food production demands rise;
8	<u>(2) Nebraska is a powerhouse agricultural state because of its</u>
9	productive soils and abundant water. However, through the years there has
10	been a depletion of organic matter and trace minerals, making the soil
11	<u>less fertile than it was;</u>
12	<u>(3) There is a significant opportunity for Nebraska farmers and</u>
13	ranchers to capitalize on the economic and production benefits of
14	improved soil health, while simultaneously improving surface and ground
15	water quality;
16	(4) Improving the health of Nebraska's soil is the most effective
17	way for agricultural producers to increase crop and forage productivity
18	and profitability while also protecting the environment;
19	(5) Appropriate planning and coordination is needed to speed up and
20	coordinate the adoption of conservation practices that rebuild and
21	protect soil carbon to increase water holding capacity and enhance the
22	vitality of the subsurface microbiome for landowners to capitalize on the
23	economic and production benefits of soil health, while simultaneously
24	enhancing water quality, capturing carbon, building resilience to drought
25	and pests, reducing greenhouse gas emissions, expanding pollinator and
26	other wildlife habitat, and protecting fragile ecosystems for a more
27	sustainable future; and
28	<u>(6) A number of states have initiated formal soil health programs</u>
29	either through the establishment of new entities or collaborations
30	between existing entities.

1	(2) The task force shall consist of the following voting members:
2	<u>(a) The Director of Agriculture or his or her designee;</u>
3	<u>(b) Two representatives of natural resources districts in Nebraska,</u>
4	appointed by the Governor;
5	<u>(c) Two academic experts in agriculture and natural resources in</u>
6	<u>Nebraska, appointed by the Governor;</u>
7	<u>(d) Six representatives from production agriculture, including at</u>
8	least two producers that are using healthy soil practices, appointed by
9	<u>the Governor;</u>
10	<u>(e) Two representatives from agribusiness, appointed by the</u>
11	<u>Governor; and</u>
12	<u>(f) Two representatives from environmental organizations in</u>
13	<u>Nebraska, appointed by the Governor.</u>
14	(3) The task force shall consist of the following nonvoting members:
15	<u>(a) The chairperson of the Natural Resources Committee of the</u>
16	Legislature, or his or her designee; and
17	<u>(b) The chairperson of the Agriculture Committee of the Legislature,</u>
18	<u>or his or her designee.</u>
19	(4) In selecting membership for appointment to the task force, the
20	<u>Governor shall seek to appoint members with relevant expertise regarding</u>
21	methods for incorporating healthy soil stewardship practices into working
22	agricultural operations and for optimizing environmental services
23	provided through such practices. Appointments to the task force shall be
24	made within sixty days after the effective date of this act and appointed
25

2	(6) For administrative and budgetary purposes, the task force shall
3	be housed within the Department of Agriculture. Additional support to
4	facilitate the work of the task force may be requested from appropriate
5	federal and state agencies.
6	Sec. 3. (1) The Healthy Soils Task Force shall:
7	(a) Develop a comprehensive healthy soils initiative for the State
8	of Nebraska;
9	(b) Develop a comprehensive action plan to coordinate efforts to
10	carry out such healthy soils initiative using standards for organic
11	matter, biological activity, biological diversity, and soil structure as
12	measures to assess improved soil health. The action plan shall set goals,
13	formulate timelines for task completion, and determine resources required
14	and resource availability. In developing the action plan, the task force
15	shall examine:
16	(i) Issues related to providing farmers and ranchers with research,
17	education, technical assistance, and demonstration projects;
18	(ii) Options for financial incentives to improve soil health; and
19	(iii) The contribution of livestock to soil health;
20	(c) Identify realistic and achievable goals and timelines for
21	<u>improvement of soil health in Nebraska through voluntary partnerships</u>
22	among agricultural producers and relevant state and local agencies and
23	other public and private entities; and
24	(d) Review provisions of the federal Agriculture Improvement Act of
25	2018, Public Law 115-334, and any implementing rules, regulations, and
26	guidelines of the United States Department of Agriculture and identify
27	opportunities to leverage state, local, or private funds under the
28	Regional Conservation Partnership Program of the United States Department
29	of Agriculture and other conservation programs for the purposes of the
30	healthy soils initiative. Such information shall be included in the
31	report issued pursuant to section 4 of this act.

1	(2) To carry out its duties, the Healthy Soils Task Force may
2	consult other agencies or organizations, including, but not limited to,
3	the University of Nebraska, the Natural Resources Conservation Service,
4	the Farm Service Agency, and the Agricultural Research Service of the
5	United States Department of Agriculture, the Soil Health Institute, the
6	Soil Health Partnership, and other state and federal agencies or public
7	or private organizations with responsibility or expertise in research,
8	demonstration, education, advising, funding, or promotion relating to
9	agronomic and other agricultural land management practices consistent
10	with the purpose of the task force.
11	Sec. 4. <u>On or before January 1, 2021, the Healthy Soils Task Force</u>

12 shall submit the comprehensive action plan and report its findings and 13 recommendations to the Governor and electronically to the Agriculture 14 <u>Committee of the Legislature. The task force shall terminate on January</u> 15 <u>1, 2021.</u>

Sec. 5. Section 81-2,162.27, Revised Statutes Cumulative Supplement,
2018, is amended to read:

81-2,162.27 (1) All money received under the Nebraska Commercial 18 19 Fertilizer and Soil Conditioner Act and the Agricultural Liming Materials Act shall be remitted to the State Treasurer for credit to the 20 Fertilizers and Soil Conditioners Administrative Fund, which fund is 21 hereby created. Money All money so received shall be used by the 22 23 department for defraying the expenses of administering the Nebraska 24 Commercial Fertilizer and Soil Conditioner Act and the Agricultural 25 Liming Materials Act. The fund may also be used to defray costs incurred by the department directly related to administrative and budgetary 26 support of the Healthy Soils Task Force pursuant to sections 1 to 4 of 27 28 this act, except that no more than ten thousand dollars may be expended 29 by the department from the fund for such purpose. Transfers may be made from the fund to the General Fund at the direction of the Legislature. 30 The State Treasurer shall transfer two hundred seventy-five thousand 31

dollars from the Fertilizers and Soil Conditioners Administrative Fund to
the General Fund on or before June 30, 2019, on such dates and in such
amounts as directed by the budget administrator of the budget division of
the Department of Administrative Services.

(2) Any unexpended balance in the Fertilizers and Soil Conditioners 5 6 Administrative Fund at the close of any biennium shall, when 7 reappropriated, be available for the uses and purposes of the fund for 8 the succeeding biennium. Any money in the fund available for investment 9 shall be invested by the state investment officer pursuant to the Nebraska Capital Expansion Act and the Nebraska State Funds Investment 10 11 Act.

Sec. 6. Original section 81-2,162.27, Revised Statutes CumulativeSupplement, 2018, is repealed.
