

LEGISLATIVE BILL 1008

Approved by the Governor August 06, 2020

Introduced by Speaker Scheer, ; at the request of the Governor.

A BILL FOR AN ACT relating to appropriations; to amend Laws 2019, LB294, sections 24, 49, 50, 92, 98, 99, 100, 102, 105, 110, 130, 147, 165, 169, 170, 200, 207, 215, 216, 217, 237, and 244, Laws 2019, LB296, section 7, and Laws 2019, LB297, sections 31, 43, and 45; to define terms; to provide, change, and eliminate appropriations for operation of state government, state aid, postsecondary education, and capital construction; to provide for scholarships as prescribed; to provide for transfers of funds; to require reports; to repeal the original sections; and to declare an emergency.

Be it enacted by the people of the State of Nebraska,

Section 1. DEFINITION OF APPROPRIATION PERIOD.

For purposes of this act and any other legislative bill passed by the One Hundred Sixth Legislature, First or Second Session, which appropriates funds, FY2018-19 means the period July 1, 2018, through June 30, 2019; FY2019-20 means the period July 1, 2019, through June 30, 2020; FY2020-21 means the period July 1, 2020, through June 30, 2021; FY2021-22 means the period July 1, 2021, through June 30, 2022; and FY2022-23 means the period July 1, 2022, through June 30, 2023.

Sec. 2. APPROPRIATION LANGUAGE.

There are hereby appropriated, for FY2019-20 and FY2020-21, the sums set forth in this act to each agency for each program from the respective funds for the general operations of state government, postsecondary education, capital construction, and state aid, except as otherwise appropriated.

Sec. 3. UNEXPENDED BALANCES AND CERTIFIED ENCUMBRANCES.

All General Fund appropriations existing on June 30, 2019, in excess of expended and certified encumbrance amounts are hereby lapsed unless otherwise provided. All Cash Fund and Revolving Fund appropriations existing on June 30, 2019, in excess of expended and certified encumbrance amounts are hereby lapsed unless otherwise expressly provided. All certified encumbrance amounts on June 30, 2019, and June 30, 2020, are hereby reappropriated for FY2019-20 and FY2020-21, respectively, which amounts shall be in addition to the amounts shown in this act.

Sec. 4. REAPPROPRIATION OF BALANCES, FY2019-20 to FY2020-21.

In addition to the appropriations set forth in this act, there are hereby reappropriated all unexpended appropriation balances existing on June 30, 2020, for FY2020-21 to the respective agencies, programs, and funds listed in this act, except as otherwise provided in this act.

Sec. 5. NEBRASKA ACCOUNTING SYSTEM MANUAL DEFINITIONS.

The definitions contained in the Nebraska Accounting System Manual, and any amendments thereto, on file with the Clerk of the Legislature are hereby adopted by the Legislature as the definitions for this act.

Sec. 6. DRAWING AND PAYING WARRANTS.

The Director of Administrative Services shall draw warrants upon the proper fund in the state treasury for an amount not to exceed the appropriations set forth in this act upon presentation of proper documentation. The State Treasurer shall pay the warrants out of the appropriate funds.

Sec. 7. CORONAVIRUS RELIEF FUNDS.

Any unallocated and unexpended Coronavirus Relief Funds identified as of November 15, 2020, shall be reoffered through a grant process to meet remaining unmet needs, including, but not limited to, rental assistance, food assistance, small business and livestock stabilization, broadband, workforce retraining, and child care.

If allowed by federal law, the State Treasurer shall transfer any unallocated or unexpended money from the funds received pursuant to the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act of 2020, section 5001, Coronavirus Relief Fund, to the Cash Reserve Fund on or before December 30, 2020, as certified by the budget administrator of the budget division of the Department of Administrative Services.

As required by section 84-612, any additional federal funds received by the State of Nebraska for undesignated general government purposes, federal revenue sharing, or general fiscal relief of the state shall be credited to the Cash Reserve Fund.

The transfer is authorized if any one of the following conditions are met: (1) Medicaid Expansion is delayed beyond the projected October 1, 2020, implementation date; (2) payment delays beyond the control of the Behavioral Health Regions would result in hardships meeting expenses incurred providing Medicaid-eligible services by the Behavioral Health Regions. Funding accessed under this condition shall be repaid once Medicaid payments are made in full to the Behavioral Health Regions for Medicaid-eligible services provided to Medicaid-eligible clients; and (3) enrollment of clients served by the Behavioral Health Regions is less than projected in the Medicaid Expansion budget calculations. The state budget administrator of the budget division of the Department of Administrative Services shall administratively transfer during FY2020-21 the portion of the appropriation certified by the chief executive officer of the Department of Health and Human Services from Budget Program 349 - Medicaid Expansion Aid to Budget Program 38 - Behavioral Health Aid. The chief executive officer shall send a copy of the certification letter to the Legislative Fiscal Office at the same time it is presented to the state budget administrator. The state budget administrator shall notify the Legislative Fiscal Office of any transfers made under this section.

The certification authority granted in this section expires on March 1, 2021.

The budget administrator of the budget division of the Department of Administrative Services shall administratively transfer during FY2019-20 and FY2020-21 available appropriations as certified by the chief executive officer of the Department of Health and Human Services from Medical Assistance, Program No. 348, to Developmental Disabilities Aid, Program No. 424.
