Any Fiscal Notes received from state agencies and political subdivisions are attached following the Legislative Fiscal Analyst Estimate.

LB 1014 contains appropriations of the Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Funds received by the State of Nebraska pursuant to the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). The bill was amended on General File by the Appropriations Committee amendment, AM2330, which contained the Committee's recommendation, as well as AM2508, AM2472, AM2542, AM2444, AM2544, and AM2478.

The following is an itemized list of appropriations included in LB 1014, by agency and organized by section number in the final reading copy. AM2542, AM 2544 added new sections on General File. AM2561 and AM2580 added new sections on Select File.

AM2652 struck final reading sections 42 and 47, which were the sections appropriating funds for the Recovery Grant Program to qualified census tracts and for grants pursuant to the Site and Building Development Act, respectively, and reduced the appropriation to DED for housing programs and eliminated the earmark and corresponding language for the Middle Income Workforce Housing Act. A total of \$250 million of appropriations were struck from the bill by AM2652, \$230 million in FY21-22 and \$20 million in FY22-23.

Details of the Appropriations Committee's recommendation may be found in the booklet entitled, "LB 1014 Distribution of the Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund (CSFRF): As Proposed by the Appropriations Committee (AM2330)" dated March 2022.

In addition to the bills incorporated into the Committee's recommendation, which are listed on the committee statement, amendments on General file incorporated provisions of LB 1269 and 1091 and re-funded an item (rural drinking water projects) included in the Governor's recommendation but not included in the Committee amendment, AM2330. Additional amendments on General File changed appropriation amounts for several sections and amended language related to appropriations for food banks, grants for meat processors, and the Recovery Grant Program.

Amendments on Select File added provisions limiting administrative expenditures for any agency, board, or commission to 15% of funds appropriated for such agency, board, or commission; limited any joint public agency from receiving ARPA funds appropriated pursuant to the act; clarified use of funds appropriated to the Department of Labor for worker training programs; and added new sections which were provisions of LB 1203 and LB 867.

Changes in amounts for each program due to adoption of amendments are reflected in the table. The appropriations for the first year are in FY21-22, which is not reflected in the table at the top of the first page.
