1 A BILL FOR AN ACT relating to the Medical Nutrition Therapy Practice Act; 2 to amend sections 38-1801, 38-1802, 38-1803, 38-1806, 38-1807, 3 38-1808, 38-1809, 38-1810, 38-1811, 38-1812, and 38-1816, Reissue 4 Revised Statutes of Nebraska, and section 38-1813, Revised Statutes Supplement, 2021; to provide, change, and eliminate definitions; to 5 6 restate intent; to change membership on a board; to provide and 7 change licensure requirements; to change provisions regarding the 8 scope of practice; to harmonize provisions; to repeal the original sections; and to outright repeal section 38-1804, Reissue Revised 9 Statutes of Nebraska. 10

11 Be it enacted by the people of the State of Nebraska,

Section 1. Section 38-1801, Reissue Revised Statutes of Nebraska, is
 amended to read:

3 38-1801 Sections 38-1801 to 38-1816 and sections 4, 5, 8, 10, 12 to
4 <u>24, and 28 to 33 of this act</u> shall be known and may be cited as the
5 Medical Nutrition Therapy Practice Act.

6 Sec. 2. Section 38-1802, Reissue Revised Statutes of Nebraska, is

38-1802 (1) The Legislature finds that:

9 (a) The unregulated practice of medical nutrition therapy can 10 clearly harm or endanger the health, safety, and welfare of the public;

(b) The public can reasonably be expected to benefit from an
 assurance of initial and continuing professional ability; and

(c) The public cannot be effectively protected by a less costeffective means than state regulation of the practice of medical nutrition therapy. The Legislature also finds that <u>dietitians and</u> <u>nutritionists</u> <u>medical nutrition therapists</u> must exercise independent judgment and that professional education, training, and experience are required to make such judgment.

(2) The Legislature further finds that the practice of medical 19 nutrition therapy in the State of Nebraska is not sufficiently regulated 20 for the protection of the health, safety, and welfare of the public. It 21 declares that this is a matter of statewide concern and it shall be the 22 policy of the State of Nebraska to promote high standards of professional 23 24 performance by those persons representing themselves as licensed 25 dietitian nutritionists and licensed nutritionists medical nutrition therapists. 26

7	a certified nutrition specialist by the Board for Certification of

Sec. 13. <u>Nonmedical weight control means nutrition-care services</u> for the purpose of reducing, maintaining, or gaining weight that do not constitute the treatment of a disease or medical condition. The term includes weight control services for healthy population groups to achieve or maintain a healthy weight.

Sec. 14. <u>Nutrition assessment means the ongoing, dynamic,</u> <u>systematic process of obtaining, reassessing, verifying, and interpreting</u> <u>biochemical, anthropometric, nutrigenomic, physical, and dietary data to</u> <u>make decisions about the nature and cause of nutrition-related problems</u> <u>and recommendations, including enteral and parenteral nutrition. Data</u> <u>collection alone does not constitute nutrition assessment.</u>

30 Sec. 15. <u>Nutrition-care services means any or all of the following</u>
31 services provided within a systematic process:

1	(1) Assessing and evaluating the nutritional needs of people and
2	groups and determining resources and constraints in the practice setting,
3	including ordering laboratory tests to check and track nutrition status,
4	creating dietary plans and orders, and monitoring the effectiveness of
5	such plans and orders;
6	(2) Establishing priorities, goals, and objectives that meet
7	nutritional needs and are consistent with available resources and
8	<u>constraints;</u>
9	(3) Providing nutrition counseling, including in health and disease;
10	(4) Developing, implementing, and managing nutrition-care systems;

14	Sec. 16. <u>Nutrition counseling means a supportive process</u>
15	characterized by a collaborative relationship between a trained counselor
16	and individuals or groups to establish food and nutrition priorities,
17	goals, and individualized action plans and general physical activity
18	guidance that acknowledge and foster responsibility for selfcare to treat
19	an existing condition or promote health.
20	Sec. 17. <u>Nutrition diagnosis means identifying and labeling</u>
21	nutritional problems managed and treated by a licensed dietitian
22	nutritionist or licensed nutritionist but does not include the medical
23	differential diagnosis of the health status of a person.
24	Sec. 18. <u>Nutrition intervention means the purposefully planned</u>
25	actions and nutrition counseling intended to positively change nutrition-
26	related behavior, risk factors, environmental conditions, or aspects of
27	<u>health care status.</u>
28	Sec. 19. <u>Nutrition monitoring and evaluation means identifying</u>
29	patient or client outcomes relevant to the nutrition diagnosis and
30	comparing the outcomes with a previous health status, intervention goals,
31	or a reference standard to determine the progress made in achieving the

1 <u>desired outcomes of nutrition-care services and to determine if planned</u>
2 interventions should be continued or revised.

3 Sec. 20. Practice of dietetics and nutrition means the integration and application of scientific principles derived from the study of food, 4 nutrition, biochemistry, metabolism, nutrigenomics, physiology, food 5 management, and from behavioral and social sciences in achieving and 6 7 maintaining health throughout the life span and in providing nutritioncare services in person or by telehealth, including medical nutrition 8 9 therapy, for the purpose of disease management and prevention, or to 10 treat or rehabilitate an illness, injury or condition. The primary functions of the practice of dietetics and nutrition are the provision of 11 12 medical nutrition therapy for the purpose of disease management or to treat or rehabilitate an illness, injury, or condition and the provision 13 of other nutrition-care services for health and wellness and as primary 14 15 prevention of chronic disease.

16 Sec. 21. <u>(1) Qualified supervisor means:</u>

17 (a) When supervising the provision of medical nutrition therapy, a
 18 person who either:

19 (i) Is a licensed dietitian nutritionist, a licensed nutritionist, 20 or a health care provider licensed in any state or territory, including 21 licensed or certified dietitian nutritionists and licensed nutritionists, 22 whose scope of practice includes the provision of medical nutrition 23 therapy; or

(ii) In the case of a person in a state that does not provide for such licensure or certification, meets such other criteria as the board may establish, including by a registered dietitian nutritionist or a certified nutrition specialist, or is a health care provider authorized in another state or territory to provide medical nutrition therapy; and

(b) When supervising the provision of nutrition-care services that
 do not constitute medical nutrition therapy, a person who:

Sec. 23. <u>Therapeutic diet means a diet intervention prescribed by a</u> physician or other health care professional that provides food or nutrients via oral, enteral, or parenteral routes as part of the treatment of a disease or diagnosed clinical condition to modify, eliminate, decrease, or increase identified micronutrients or macronutrients in the diet or to provide mechanically altered food when indicated.

(ii)(A) Has received a master's or doctorate degree from an
 accredited college or university in human nutrition, nutrition education,
 food and nutrition, or public health nutrition or in an equivalent major
 course of study approved by the board; or

5 (B) Has received a master's or doctorate degree from an accredited 6 college or university which includes a major course of study in clinical 7 nutrition. Such course of study shall consist of not less than a combined 8 two hundred hours of biochemistry and physiology and not less than 9 seventy-five hours in human nutrition.

10 (2) For purposes of this section, accredited college or university 11 means an institution currently listed with the United States Secretary of 12 Education as accredited. Applicants who have obtained their education 13 outside of the United States and its territories shall have their 14 academic degrees validated as equivalent to a baccalaureate or master's 15 degree conferred by a United States accredited college or university.

16 (3)(a) The practice of medical nutrition therapy shall be performed 17 under the consultation of a physician licensed pursuant to section 18 38-2026 or sections 38-2029 to 38-2033.

(b) A licensed medical nutrition therapist may order patient diets,
 including therapeutic diets, in accordance with this subsection.

21 Sec. 28. <u>A person shall be eligible to be a licensed nutritionist</u> 22 <u>if such person is eighteen years of age or older, submits a completed</u> 23 <u>application as required by the board, submits fees required by the board,</u> 24 <u>and furnishes evidence of:</u>

25 (1)(a) Certification as a certified nutrition specialist or proof of 26 successful completion of the examination administered by the board for 27 Certification of Nutrition Specialists of the American Nutrition 28 Association or a similar successor entity approved by the department or 29 an equivalent examination dealing with all aspects of the practice of 30 dietetics and nutrition approved by the department;

31 (b) A master's or doctoral degree from a college or university

1 accredited at the time of graduation from the appropriate accrediting 2 agency recognized by the Council on Higher Education Accreditation and the United States Department of Education with a major in human 3 4 nutrition, foods and nutrition, community nutrition, public health nutrition, nutrition education, nutrition, nutrition science, clinical 5 nutrition, applied clinical nutrition, nutrition counseling, nutrition 6 7 and functional medicine, nutritional biochemistry, nutrition and integrative health, or an equivalent course of study as approved by the 8 9 board that provides the knowledge requirements necessary for the 10 competent provision of medical nutrition therapy; or

11 (c) An academic degree from a foreign country that has been 12 validated as equivalent to the degree and course of study described in 13 subdivision (b) of this subsection as determined by the board;

(2) Successful completion of coursework leading to competence in 14 15 medical nutrition therapy which includes (a) fifteen semester hours of clinical or life sciences, including such courses as chemistry, organic 16 17 chemistry, biology, molecular biology, biotechnology, botany, genetics, genomics, neuroscience, experimental science, immunotherapy, pathology, 18 pharmacology, toxicology, research methods, applied statistics, 19 biostatistics, epidemiology, energy production, molecular pathways, 20 hormone and transmitter regulations and imbalance, and pathophysiologic 21 22 base of disease, with at least three semester hours in human anatomy and physiology or the equivalent, and (b) fifteen semester hours of nutrition 23 and metabolism, with at least six semester hours in biochemistry or an 24 25 equivalent approved by the board; and

26 (3) Successful completion of a board-approved, planned, continuous 27 internship or a documented, planned, continuous, supervised practice 28 experience with a qualified supervisor, demonstrating competency in 29 nutrition-care services and the provision of medical nutrition therapy 30 comprised of not less than one thousand hours involving at least two 31 hundred hours of nutrition assessment and nutrition diagnosis, two

1 hundred hours of nutrition intervention or counseling, and two hundred 2 hours of nutrition monitoring and evaluation. A minimum of seven hundred 3 hours of the supervised practice experience is required in professional 4 work settings and no more than three hundred hours may be in alternate 5 supervised experiences such as observational interactions between client and practitioner, simulation, case studies, or role playing. This 6 7 experience shall be under the supervision of a qualified supervisor. Qualified supervisors shall provide appropriate supervision of an 8 9 applicant's supervised practice experience in the provision of medical 10 nutrition therapy and provide general supervision of an applicant's provision of other nutrition-care services that do not constitute medical 11 12 nutrition therapy. For purposes of this subdivision, a supervisor shall be licensed in this state if supervising an applicant providing medical 13 nutrition therapy to a person in this state. A supervisor who obtained a 14 15 doctoral degree outside of the United States and territories of the United States shall have the degree validated as equivalent to a doctoral 16 17 degree conferred by an accredited college or university in the United States by a credential evaluation agency recognized by the United States 18 19 Department of Education.

20 Sec. 29. <u>The board shall develop requirements for appropriate</u> 21 <u>supervision consistent with prevailing professional standards considering</u> 22 <u>factors that include, but are not limited to, level of education,</u> 23 <u>experience, and level of responsibility. The requirements shall include:</u> 24 <u>(1) Adequate, active, and continuing review of the supervisee's</u>

25 <u>activities to assure that the supervisee is performing as directed and</u> 26 complying with the statutes and all related administrative regulations;

A temporary licensee shall be supervised by a 12 13 qualified supervisor. A temporary license shall be valid for one year or until the temporary licensee takes the examination, whichever occurs 14 15 first. The temporary licensee shall be designated by a title clearly indicating such licensee's status as a student or trainee. If a temporary 16 17 licensee fails the examination required by section 38-1813 or section 28 of this act, the temporary license shall be null and void, except that 18 19 the department, with the recommendation of the board, may extend the temporary license upon a showing of good cause for up to six months. A 20 21 temporary license shall not be issued to any person who fails to pass the 22 examination if such person did not hold a valid temporary license prior to the failure to pass the examination. 23 24 (2) This section shall not apply to a temporary license issued as

(1) Unless otherwise authorized or exempted under the Medical Nutrition Therapy Practice Act, (a) only a licensed dietitian nutritionist or licensed nutritionist may provide medical nutrition therapy, and (b) no person shall use the title dietitian nutritionist, nutritionist, dietitian, nutrition counselor, nutrition specialist, nutritional therapy practitioner, nutritional therapy consultant,

1 certified nutrition therapy practitioner, master nutrition therapist, licensed dietitian nutritionist, licensed medical nutrition therapist, 2 licensed nutritionist dietician, licensed nutrition specialist, medical 3 4 nutrition therapist, or licensed nutrition specialist, or the 5 abbreviation LDN or LN, or any other title, designation, word, letter, abbreviation, or insignia indicating that the person is a provider of 6 7 medical nutrition therapy or licensed under the Medical Nutrition Therapy Practice Act unless the person is a licensed dietitian nutritionist or a 8 9 licensed nutritionist. (2) Only a person who is issued a license as a dietitian 10 nutritionist under the act may use the words licensed dietitian 11 nutritionist, dietitian nutritionist, or dietitian or the letters LDN in 12 13 connection with such person's name. Only a person who is issued a license as a nutritionist under the act may use the words licensed nutritionist 14 15 or the letters LN in connection with his or her name. Only a person licensed under the act may use the word nutritionist in connection with 16 17 such person's name. A person may use any lawfully earned federally trademarked title, and the following persons may use the following words, 18 19 titles, or letters: (a) A registered dietitian nutritionist may use registered dietitian, registered dietitian nutritionist, rd, or rdn; (b) 20 21 a person who is credentialed by the Board for Certification of Nutrition 22 Specialists as a certified nutrition specialist may use certified 23 nutrition specialist or cns; or (c) a board-certified nutrition

24 pharmacist may use the title nutrition specialist.

25 Sec. 32. (1) A licensed dietitian nutritionist or a licensed
26 <u>nutritionist, unless otherwise exempt, shall:</u>

27 (a) Provide medical nutrition therapy using evidence-based practice
 28 and the nutrition-care process for patients and clients in clinical and
 29 community settings for the purpose of treatment or management of a
 30 diagnosed medical disease or medical condition. The nutrition-care
 31 process involves application of the scientific method to medical

1 <u>nutrition therapy and consists of four distinct, but interrelated, steps</u>

4 (b) Use specialized knowledge and skill to apply the systematic 5 problem-solving method to make diagnostic judgments when providing medical nutrition therapy for safe, effective, and high-quality care; and 6 7 (c) Use critical thinking to collect relevant data, determine nutrition diagnosis based upon interpreted data, establish patient and 8 9 client goals, determine a nutrition plan and interventions to solve the 10 problem, and evaluate the effectiveness of interventions and progress toward the desired goals or outcomes. 11

12 <u>(2) A licensed dietitian nutritionist or a licensed nutritionist</u> 13 <u>may:</u>

(a) Accept or transmit written, verbal, delegated, or 14 electromagnetically transmitted orders from a referring provider 15 consistent with the Medical Nutrition Therapy Practice Act and rules and 16 17 regulations adopted and promulgated pursuant to the act and with any controlling protocols established to implement medical nutrition therapy; 18 19 (b) Recommend and order patient diets, including therapeutic diets, oral nutrition supplements, and dietary supplements, in accordance with 20 21 the Medical Nutrition Therapy Practice Act and the rules and regulations 22 adopted and promulgated pursuant to the act. Therapeutic diets may 23 include oral, enteral, or parenteral nutrition therapy. Enteral and 24 parenteral nutrition therapy consists of enteral feedings or specialized 25 intravenous solutions and associated nutrition-related services as part of a therapeutic diet and shall only be ordered, initiated, or performed 26 27 by a licensed dietitian nutritionist or licensed nutritionist who also meets one of the following criteria: 28

29 <u>(i) The licensee is a registered dietitian nutritionist;</u>

30 (ii) The licensee is a certified nutrition support clinician
 31 certified by the National Board of Nutrition Support Certification; or

1	(iii) The licensee meets other requirements demonstrating competency
2	as determined by the board in evaluating and ordering enteral and
3	parenteral therapy and administering enteral therapy;
4	<u>(c) Order medical or laboratory tests related to nutritional</u>
5	therapeutic treatments; and
6	<u>(d) Implement prescription drug dose adjustments for specific</u>
7	disease treatment protocols within the limits of such licensee's
8	knowledge, skills, judgment, and clinical practice guidelines pursuant to
9	any applicable and controlling facility-approved protocol and as approved
10	and delegated by the licensed prescriber, physician, or other authorized
11	health care provider who prescribed the drug or drugs to be adjusted.
12	Nothing in this subdivision shall be construed to permit individuals
13	licensed under the Medical Nutrition Therapy Practice Act to
14	independently prescribe or initiate drug treatment. A licensed dietitian
15	nutritionist or a licensed nutritionist may recommend and order or
16	discontinue vitamin and mineral supplements.

17 (3) Nothing in this section shall be construed to limit the ability
 18 of any other licensed health care professional to order therapeutic diets
 19 if ordering therapeutic diets falls within the scope of practice of the
 20 licensed health care professional.

A student enrolled in an accredited course on dietetics 21 Sec. 33. 22 and nutrition recognized by the board may perform any action necessary to 23 complete the student's course of study and engage in the practice of 24 medical nutrition therapy under the appropriate supervision of a 25 supervisor in accordance with section 38-1813 or section 28 of this act for a period of no more than five years after the student completes the 26 course of study. The board may, in its discretion, grant a limited 27 28 extension to such five-year period in the event of extraordinary 29 circumstances to allow the student to satisfy the qualifications for licensure under section 38-1813 or section 28 of this act. For purposes 30 31 of this section, extraordinary circumstances may include circumstances in 1 which a person who legally provides medical nutrition therapy in another 2 state has not met the qualifications for licensure under section 38-1813 3 or section 28 of this act within the five-year period after completion of 4 the course of study.
