Summary of purpose and/or changes:

LB 531 cleans up language in the Economic Recovery Act (LB 1024 (2022)) by removing certain requirements relating to coordinated plans and directing direct investment to the fund after July 1st, 2023. The Economic Recovery Act, enacted with the passage of Legislative Bill 1024 by the Nebraska State Legislature in 2022, provides at least \$335 million in funding to assist North Omaha, South Omaha, and other communities that were disproportionately impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Section-by-Section Summary:

-Section 1 of the bill amends 81-12,241 by (1) removing a provision that requires the division develop a coordinated plan, (2) removing references to the coordinated plan, (3) prioritizes grants used within the boundaries of a city in the metropolitan class, (4) removes the requirement that the Economic Recovery and Incentives Division must rely on any studies produced pursuant to section 81-12,242, and (5) creates a new unnamed amount for grants distributed under the grant program.

-Section 2 amends 81-12,243 to direct investment earns made after Jul 1, 2023 to the fund. The section also states that no funds shall be expended until at least 30 days after the effective date of the act.

-Section 3 amends 81-12,244 to harmonize with the previous provisions.

-Section 4 repeals original sections.

-Section 5 enacts an emergency clause.

Explanation of amendments:

AM 1128 outlines the usage and administration of the North and South Omaha grant program. Applicants to the North and South Omaha Recovery Grant Program must be listed in the coordination plan by the Economic Recovery Special Committee of the legislature to be eligible for grants. Also, this amendment explains how the grant will relieve the negative impact of the COVID-19 public health emergency within a qualified census tract within the boundaries of



a city of the metropolitan class.

Page-by-Page Summary of Changes Made By AM 1128

-Page 1:

Line 5: strikes "and section 6 of this act"

Lines 22-27: strikes mentions to the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021

-Page 2:

Lines 1-2: strikes mentions to the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021

Lines 8-10: removes requirement of the Incentives Division of the Department of Economic Development to develop a coordinated plan and grant application and scoring process to award grants

Lines 11-26: removes requirement that grants must be awarded within qualified census tracts located within the boundaries of a city of the metropolitan class. Also removes requirement that the division must submit a copy of an initial coordinated plan to the Economic Recovery Special Committee of the Legislature.

-Page 3:

Lines 10-15: removes grant distribution boundary requirements within the city of the metropolitan class Line 22: Changes "sixty million" to "one hundred million"

-Page 6:

Lines 2-3: States that investment earnings on and after July 1, 2023 shall be credited to the fund.

Lines 4-9: Removes coordinated plan requirements

Lines 12-20: Removes reference to the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021

Lines 21-26: Removes coordinated plan requirements

-Page 7:

-Lines 18-20: Removes requirement that the Department of Economic Development shall not use money from the General Fund to implement or administer the grants provided under the Economic Recovery Act.

Lines 21-31: Provides that the Economic Recovery and Incentives Division of the Department of Economic Development shall create and administer the North and South Omaha Recovery Grant Program. This change also provides how an applicant can be eligible for a grant under the Program.

-Page 8:

Lines 1-31: Continues details of how an applicant be eligible for a grant under the Program. Also requires the Department to award specific grants.

-Page 12:

Lines 3-7: Requires the State Treasurer to transfer four hundred fifty million dollars form the Cash Reserve Fund to the General Fund as soon as administratively possible.

Lines 8-18: Requires the Department of Natural Resources to award a grant of two hundred million dollars to a city of the primary class.

Lines 19-25: Requires the Department of Environment and Energy to award grants totaling not more than fifty million dollars to install reverse osmosis systems in (1) small and rural communities, and (2) private water systems of test levels for nitrates in drinking water pumped for private wells are above ten parts per million.
