Summary of purpose and/or changes:

LB 691 would require the city or its streetcar authority to pay its fixed rail or streetcar system's natural gas and water utilities costs.

Planning and research for a Omaha streetcar began between 2008 and 2009. An advanced conceptual engineering plan was first announced in 2014 and revised in 2018 by Metro Transit, with an estimated cost of \$170 million.

In 2022, a revised plan was announced by Mayor Jean Stothert and the Greater Omaha Chamber of Commerce's Urban Core Committee. The streetcar will be built, operated, and maintained without a property tax rate increase or sales tax increase. It will run on a three-mile route from Cass to Farnam on South 10th Street, Farnam west to 42nd Street, and back to 10th Street on Harney. The streetcar is expected to be operational in 2026, and free for all riders.

Of concern here is the \$20.5 million utility line relation and reinforcement needed to enable a safe downtown-to-midtown route. The Metropolitan Utilities District (MUD) has resisted contributing any more than \$4.2 million, saying a higher amount risks a rate hike across its four-county customer base or a delay in scheduled utility work for neighborhoods with older pipes and greater needs.

Section 1 amends 14-3,109 to provide a section that would require the natural gas and water utilities costs for a fixed rail or streetcar system be covered by the city in which the rail or streetcar system is located.

Section 2 of the bill repeals the original section.
